GUEST STUCK OVERNIGHT IN HEAVENLY GONDOLA: The trip for one recent guest to *Heavenly Ski Resort* was anything but heavenly. A female snowboarder was trapped overnight on its gondola. The guest told reporters that she was directed by a Heavenly staff member to board the gondola shortly before 5 p.m. on Feb. 25. The lift stopped running about two minutes after she boarded. Resort workers only discovered her predicament when the lifts began running again the next morning, about 15 hours after she had boarded. "We have rigorous protocols to ensure our gondola and chairlifts are fully unloaded each day. I have reviewed our investigation, and it is clear there was a breakdown in those protocols that day. I take full responsibility as well as ownership to ensure it is addressed so that it never happens again", said Heavenly COO, Tom Fortune. The guest said she did not have a phone with her, and her cries for help went unheard by passing employees, so she ended up spending the night in the gondola.

STIFEL PALISADES TAHOE CUP GETS THE GREEN LIGHT: It's Official -- the Audi FIS Ski World Cup Tour cleared for takeoff at Palisades Tahoe. The International Ski and Snowboard Federation (FIS) gave the go-ahead for The *Stifel Palisades Tahoe Cup* to host the Giant Slalom and Slalom scheduled for February 23rd - 25th. As with every stop on the Audi FIS Ski World Cup, each mountain must pass "snow control" ahead of the races to ensure course quality for the racers. Palisades Tahoe has received 179" inches of snowfall this season and groomers and racecourse planners have been working on the course since February 1st. "It's a great honor to be the host resort for the Stifel Palisades Tahoe Cup as we continue to bring international competition back to our legendary slopes," says Dee Byrne, COO and President of Palisades Tahoe.

CLIMATE CHANGE TERRIFIES SKI INDUSTRY: According to National Ski Areas Association, climate change is "the number one threat to the snowsports industry". According to Rutger's University Global Snow Lab, "as the globe warms, snow, overall, is decreasing. Between 1972 and 2020, the average portion of North America covered by snow decreased at a rate of about 1,870 square miles per year". That trend is expected to continue, scientists say. "Climate change is an existential threat to the industry", Adrienne Saia Isaac, spokesperson for the Ski Areas Association, told USA TODAY. "It's way beyond skiing and riding." She said that the snowsports industry is weather-dependent and the key is snow. "While we're used to the inherent uncertainty of our business, climate change exacerbates this challenge in different ways across the 37 states and six regions in which ski areas operate". Scientists say that climate change represents a substantial risk to the profitability and sustainability of ski tourism because of reduced and more variable natural snow, and increased snowmaking requirements and costs. As the Earth continues to warm, it's natural to assume that ski seasons will be getting shorter due to the lack of snow. But until recently, this wasn't the case. Ski seasons across the U.S. were actually getting longer in the 1980s, 1990s, and 2000s, despite warming average temperatures and in some regions less and more variable natural snow. The massive investment in snowmaking made this possible. However, in the 2010s that trend stopped and now average ski seasons have stabilized or have declined slightly. This tells us snowmaking can no longer offset warming and as temperatures continue to rise, we're now past the era of peak ski seasons in the U.S.

ANOTHER BIG YEAR, EVEN BIGGER LIFTS: North American ski areas installed 57 new ropeways in 2023, including some of the biggest lifts ever built on the continent. One year ago, the major lift story was Vail Resorts' Epic Lift Upgrade, a scramble to build 18 new lifts across 12 mountains in one summer, part of a banner construction year across the industry. This year, the pendulum swung as Alterra Mountain Company and Boyne Resorts became the largest customers for new lifts, from fancy eight-passenger chairs to utilitarian fixed-grip triples. While the overall number of projects stayed about the same as 2022—57 new ropeway

installations at North American ski areas this year compared to 58 last year—average project size increased in 2023 as operators boosted capacity and installed some big lifts with a total of 125,735 vertical transport feet per hour (VTFH), up about 7,200 from 2022. Now, that was a BIG project!
