Snowsports Leadership Academy

The **Snowsports Leadership Academy** is a FWSA education program designed to provide FWSA members training and tools to enhance and expand ski clubs and be recognized industry wide as having a measure of standards and consistency.

The first Snowsports Leadership Academy sessions presented at the FWSA 2008 Convention in Seattle, Washington were 'I'm Elected, Now What" and "Now You Have Them, How Do You Keep Them". The second two sessions at the FWSA 2009 Convention in Reno, Nevada were "Travel Wise – Smart Tips for Trips" and "Risky Business – A Slippery Slope". The third set of sessions at the FWSA 2010 Convention in Indian Wells, California were "Ethics - Doing the Right Thing" and "Tech Works – Building Your Club Using the Social Media". The fourth set of sessions at the FWSA 2011 Convention in Industry Hills, California were "Skiing Equipment Design: Getting the Right Fit; Building Membership Through Racing" and "Taking Office: Now What?" The FWSA 2012 Convention in Odgen modules were "The Future Is Now" with Luke Bodensteiner (USSA Executive VP Athletics) and "Marketing, Mentoring, Media" where participants divided into small groups to explore aspects of ski club involvement.

The modules for the 2013 convention are "Make Club Meetings Fun While Getting Business Done" and a refreshed and updated version of an earlier module "Keeping Pace as a High Tech Club." Recognizing that each convention has club members who have not attended previously, one module is typically a new topic and the other is a repackaged presentation of an earlier topic.

All attendees of the Snowsports Leadership Academy sessions receive a certificate of attendance at the Sunday morning general session.


On the snow, Wong is an absolute technician, not only in style and technique, but he truly understands equipment science and

Daron Rahlves



The most decorated American Downhill and Super G skier in history. Daron won 12 World Cup races, had 28 World Cup podiums, 7 US National Titles, is the 2001 World Champion in Super G, Silver medal at the 2005 Worlds in DH and Bronze medal in GS.

He was the winner of the legendary Hahnenkamm Downhill in 2003 and SG in 2004 along with 7 podium finishes in Kitzbuhel over 5 years. Now ski cross is the competition of his choice. In 2008 Daron took the win in Skier X at Winter X Games 12 and finished 3rd overall on the Jeep Skiing/48 Straight Tour.

Daron Rahlves was born June 12, 1973 in Walnut Creek, California. Growing up in Nor Cal he was exposed to all kinds of sports: soccer, tennis, golf, waterskiing, jet skiing, motocross and snow skiing. Every winter in Tahoe and summers at Clear Lake, snow skiing and water sports became one of Daron's many strong suits.

At the age of 12, Daron's family moved up to Tahoe so that he could focus on competing. During the summers, he stayed serious about another passion: jet skiing. After 4 years racing 440 Super Stock and the modified class he became the Expert World Champion in 1993 and that same year was named to the US Ski Team. His 13 years on the National Team included racing World Cup, being named to 4 World Championship teams and 3 Winter Olympic Games.

Now he's made a transition from Alpine Ski Racing to skier cross comps on The 48 Straight Jeep King of the Mountain Tour, X-Games and the 2010 Olympics. Also on his plate is a goal of big mountain free skiing and filming with the top ski movie crews. "My goal is to explore more of the sport of skiing. That's why I decided to retire from World Cup racing when I was on top and healthy. On my own terms." As an ambassador for Sugar Bowl Resort, Daron works with their ski academy and ski team passing on his knowledge from his ski racing success. He balances his time at home in Truckee, CA and a place at the beach in Encinitas, CA. Daron and wife Michelle are raising twins Dreyson and Miley.

Dave Ludwig



Dave Ludwig, founder of *Hope On The Slopes (HOTS)*, states in his own words "The inception of what is now the American Cancer Society *Hope On The Slopes* began as an idea or thought while riding the chair one day at White Pass. In those days, White Pass had a RFID vertical tracking system that I enjoyed using. We could track our runs and vertical for the day and the year to date. My thought at the time was 'how could this be used as a fundraiser'? Since this early concept phase, White Pass has helped develop and refine *Hope On The Slopes* at White Pass, and has been involved in the expansion of the event to almost every new location.

Since inception in 2002, over \$2.5 million has been raised by *Hope on the Slopes* for the American Cancer Society.

In 2011 Dave founded *Ski & Ride For A Cure*, a 501(c)3 organization, the purpose of which is to expand *Hope On The Slopes*

to ski areas and resorts where the ACS did not have budget or trained staff. This grew into an agreement with the ACS to transfer the *Hope On The Slopes* events in the West to the new non-profit. The American Cancer Society remains the beneficiary of funds raised. We believe strongly in the mission of the American Cancer Society.

In its first season of operations for *Ski & Ride For A Cure*, the team managed the transition of the seven *Hope On The Slopes* in the West (Breckenridge, Silverton, Ski Bowl, Mt. Spokane, Stevens Pass, Crystal Mountain, and White Pass). In total, these fundraising events were supported by approximately 1.500 volunteers, and raised over one-quarter of a million dollars.

The plan is to grow and expand by two to five new *Hope On The Slopes* events for next year by identifying and communicating to new resorts that may be interested in hosting a HOTS event. This will be done by becoming more visible in the industry, gaining referrals via their current event managers and volunteers, and by direct marketing.

About the cause: About 12 million people living in the United States today have had some type of cancer. Half of all men and one-third of all women in the U.S. will develop cancer during their lifetimes. This terrible disease impacts the lives of millions of people every day. The funds raised for the American Cancer Society through *Ski & Ride For A Cure* go to research, early detection, patient services and support.

Through *Ski & Ride For A Cure* we now have an opportunity as an industry of resorts, volunteers, and business supporters to make a difference in the fight against cancer.

Bill Clark

Executive Director, Western SkiSport Museum Executive Director, Auburn Ski Club, Inc.

As Executive Director, Bill directs the Auburn Ski Club Training Center and the Western SkiSport Museum on Donner Summit. The Auburn Ski Club Training Center is a non-profit facility located on Donner Summit, adjacent to Boreal Mountain Resort. The training center provides a variety of programs for 1500+ members including Junior Alpine, Snowboard, Nordic and biathlon ski teams; recreational XC skiing and clinics on club XC trails; and competitions, including NCAA and USSA national competitions.

Bill began skiing as a Junior Far West racer with the Auburn Ski Club and was a four-way competitor at Sierra College. He was program director and head coach of the Auburn Ski Club's Alpine program from 1979-1990. He is a former member of the U.S. Ski Hall of Fame selection committee, the Far West Alpine and the Far West Nordic Board of Directors. He is currently a board member of the Squaw Valley Olympic Museum Founda-




tion, which is working to establish a new museum there. He was a member of the planning committee for the 2010 50th Anniversary Olympic Heritage Celebration.

The Western SkiSport Museum was founded in 1969 by the Auburn Ski Club. Its mission is to collect, preserve and exhibit the history of winter ski sports in the western United States. Featured exhibits include: Auburn Ski Club; Snowshoe Thompson; California Gold Camps and the Longboard Skiers; 10th Mountain Division "Ski Troops of World War II," Yosemite Winter Club, Sun Valley and Alta Ski Areas; U.S. Ski Team and Olympic history; Sugar Bowl; Ski Jumpers of the 1930's and 1940's; Dodie Post, Olympic skier from Reno; Dick "Maddog" Buek, legendary skier from Donner Summit; Western Ski Hall of Fame; Jeff Hamilton, Auburn Ski Club skier, 150 mph world record speed skier and 1992 Olympic bronze medalist; U.S. Forest Service; and Roy Mikkelsen, Auburn Ski Club jumper and Olympic ski jumper in 1936.

The archives and library are available by appointment. The museum has movies dating from 1919 and a publication *The Lost Sierra—Gold, Ghosts and Skis*.

Val Rios

President, 10th Mountain Division Association Sierra Nevada Chapter



Valentine (Val) Rios is the current President of the Sierra Nevada Chapter of the 10th Mountain Division Association and Past President of the 10th Mountain Division Descendants . He is the son of Cruz Rios, 94, who served with the 10th Mountain Division, 87th Regiment, Company K. Val has lived in Fresno most of his life. An educator for more than 30 years, he has at taught at Garces High School in Bakersfield and at San Joaquin Memorial High School in Fresno. He has been a high school counselor at McLane high school in Fresno for just over 20 years. He is married to Georgia Rios, a counselor at Central East High School in Fresno. They have two sons.

Billy Kidd

1964 Olympic Slalom Silver Medalist

When you think of legends in American skiing the name **Billy Kidd** is at the top of the list. He became America's hero back in the 1964 Olympics when he and teammate Jimmie Heuga became the first American men to win Olympic medals in alpine skiing — a silver for Kidd and a bronze for Heuga in the slalom at Innsbruck, Austria.

Although his racing is confined mainly to the "Legends Races" now, he continues his involvement in the sport as Director of Skiing at Steamboat; TV commentator at the Olympics; Head Skiing Coach for Special Olympics as well as equipment design, books, videos and movies. Kidd grew up in Stowe, Vermont and raced internationally for nine years on the U.S. Ski Team. While racing, he studied at the University of Colorado and graduated in 1969 with a degree in economics. After establishing his prominence in the ski world in the 1964 Olympics, Billy marked yet another "first" for American men by becoming the first person to win both Amateur and Pro World Championships in a single year-1970. Kidd went on to win the Amateur World Championship in Val Gardena, Italy. Then Billy turned pro and two weeks later won the World Pro Championships.



Billy has made his home Steamboat Springs, Colorado since 1970 and spends much of the winter as Director of Skiing at the Steamboat Ski Area and running his Billy Kidd Performance Center. The Center features a personal "hands-on" approach, using on-slope video analysis and a Personal Skiing Profile. Billy and his coaches guarantee they'll make you a better skier.

Billy also leads Steamboat's Ute Future Olympian program, which brings Native American youngsters from Utah reservations to Steamboat, where they build self-confidence by learning to ski and snowboard. His efforts with Native American youth recently earned him the Texaco Star Regional Award.

Because his Olympic teammate and long-time friend Jimmie Heuga had MS, Kidd is also involved in fundraising for Multiple Sclerosis and is on the board of directors of the Jimmie Heuga Center for the Reanimation of the Physically Challenged, now known as Can Do MS.

After a lifetime of skiing Kidd still enjoys helping people ski better. Along with coaching at his camps, he hosts a free daily clinic at 1:00 on the slopes at Steamboat.

This all adds up to a total commitment to the sport of skiing. Kidd skis for enjoyment and excitement--two things that are as much a part of skiing as the name **Billy Kidd**.

Manager where he managed Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management lands. Before being named Associate Center Manager there, he was the Cooperative Landscape Conservation Coordinator, overseeing eco-regional assessments, healthy landscape initiatives, and climate change response.

Dunkelberger began his career with the Forest Service in 1980 as the Lead Wilderness Ranger on the Mt. Baker-Snoqualmie National Forest. He continued his work in recreation and wilderness on the Grand Mesa, Uncompanger, and Gunnison National Forests in Colorado. He also served as the Arapaho National Recreation Area Manager on the Arapaho-Roosevelt National Forests and Pawnee National Grassland for four years.

Dunkelberger is no stranger to Humboldt-Toiyabe country. Before returning to Colorado and the San Juan he was Field Manager for the BLM Bishop Field Office with land management responsibilities in California's Eastern Sierra and coordination with adjacent Nevada jurisdictions and stakeholders. In that role, he emphasized conservation partnerships, collaboration, citizen-centered stewardship, and interagency coordination.

An outdoor enthusiast, Dunkleberger enjoys hiking, mountain biking, skiing, hunting, and fishing.

Lila Lapanja, a life-time resident of North Lake Tahoe and daughter of Vojko and Margie Lapanja of Incline Village, NV, is the FWSA Athletic Scholarship's first recipient to have been selected to the U.S. Ski Team.

Lila was recognized by the scholarship committee as a formidable talent at the age of 14 when she stood in the top ten for all four disciplines. During the 2009-2010 season, she had ten top ten finishes including six on the podium. She finished the year nationally ranked 6th in Downhill, 9th in Giant Slalom and 4th in Slalom. The following year, Lila finished the year nationally ranked 6th in Downhill, 9th in Giant Slalom and 4th in Slalom.

At age 16, she was selected for the U.S. Ski Team's development team. During the 2012 race season she exceeded expectations. She took fourth place in Slalom at the U.S. Nationals and finished the season ranked 1st in Giant Slalom, 1st in Super Combined, 2nd in Slalom, and 3rd in Super G for her year group.

As a result of her strong performance, Lila was appointed to the USST's Europa Cup Technical Team. This season she defended her Junior Combined title at the US National Championships and also led the charge for the USA as the top-ranked American in both Slalom and Giant Slalom at the World Junior Championships in Quebec.

Like many of her racing contemporaries, Lila had to accomplish her required academic coursework through a variety of scholastic options. Training, travel and competition required long periods away from home. In 2011, the year she was selected for the U.S. Ski Team, Margie Lapanja put over 7,000 miles on the family car driving Lila to ski races. Lila for her part sacrificed much of the social life that most teenagers enjoy. Academics were completed through a variety of in-class and online courses. Despite the demands on her time, Lila maintained a 4.35 grade point average and on June 7 she graduated from Forest Charter High School as Salutatorian of her class.

Her achievements are all the more remarkable because Kayleigh was born with Cystic Fibrosis; a disease that primarily affects the lungs and digestive system. 




The winner of this year's prize is Ingrid Wicken, California Ski Library, for her 2012 book *Lost Ski Areas of Southern California*. The lost ski areas (LSA) projects started on the East Coast and Far West's Ethan Chickering launched the Western version (WELSAP) in 1992.

Wicken's book is the most detailed approach to LSAs and will be continued with her research underway for the LSAs of Northern California. The accounting for lost ski areas uncovers real historical treasures – personalities, partnerships, champions and championships – and shows the fabric and evolution of snowsports.

Did you know that Mt. Palomar had a ski area in 1967? That a year round ski area, Ski Villa in Carbon Canyon, opened in Orange County in 1966? It was a concrete slope paved in plastic tiles, and had a vertical of 280 feet. A pine needle slope was operated by Sepp Benedikter in the summer of 1939. It was on a slope at the corner of Lankershim and Ventura Boulevards, the current location of Universal Studios. Both Ski Villa and the pine needle slope operated for day and night skiing. The pine needle slope attracted many Hollywood celebrities.





The winner of the Western Ski Heritage Prize receives a 5-day vacation for two from Steamboat Ski and Resort Corporation, including 5-day lift tickets to Steamboat, 5 days of rentals, half-day lesson for two and 5 nights lodging.



FWSA Safety Person of the Year 2013 Gordon Lusk



The 2013 Safety Person of Year winner is Gordon Lusk of the Mountain High Ski Club of the Northwest Ski Club Council. Gordon is a long time expert skier. He is the president of the PACRAT Race League and has been involved many years with safety in racing. His efforts have been extensive with supervising course set-up, course starters, and crew. He has presented course safety information and techniques to club members and has written articles on this. Gordon has also coached high school and junior racers and promoted the FWRA SCHOLAR-SHIP program to these kids.

The FWSA believes that safety is an important component in snowsports. We recognize that the ski resorts do an extraordinary job of minimizing hazards. Ultimately, safety is based on individual responsibility and behavior.

Aspen-Snowmass has partnered with the FWSA for over a decade in recognizing the individual who has done the most to improve safety-consciousness. The Safety Person of the Year

Award includes a week of skiing at Aspen-Snowmass, accommodations at The Crestwood and The Gant, airfare, and equipment rental. This fine award shows Aspen-Snowmass commitment to promoting safety. We would like to thank Mary Manning of Aspen Snowmass for running this program for a number of years.

We encourage each ski club to promote this fine award by nominating individuals who have contributed to snow safety through on slope activities, presentations, articles, etc. Details may be found on the FWSA.org website.

Snowsports Builder Awards

The FWSA Snowsports Builder Awards are given to individuals who have made an indelible positive impact on snowsports. The builder honored may be for achievements in athletics, the press, publishers, historians, industry, humanitarian work, area development, or technology. In short, they honor those who have made significant contributions to snowsports.

Doug Pringle

Disabled Sports USA

Doug Pringle is a ground breaker for disabled sports and a tireless innovator and organizational developer of services to the disabled since the 1960s. He remains so to this day, continuing

his four decades of service to the expanding disabled community.



Doug Pringle, U.S. Military Academy Class of 67, arrived that year in Vietnam. Three months later, he lost most of his right leg in combat. His rehabilitation reinforced his determination to not allow injury to exclude him from recreational activities. He found that there were but three amputee ski clubs in the USA and in 1969 he and 13 other amputees organized and raced in an Amputee Championship at Donner Summit. This was the initial point for what is now Disabled Sports USA. It all began on snow. And Doug Pringle has been central in the evolution of disabled sports in the USA.

Forty years ago, many of the wounded from the Vietnam War became involved in skiing because major military hospitals were including the sport as part of rehabilitation training.

Pringle got hooked on skiing through his participation in the National Handicapped Sports and Recreation Association (NHSRA) and he became its President in 1970. He further expanded the network to 25 chapters over the next six years. As a member of the Professional Ski Instructor's Association

(PSIA), he expanded Learn to Ski clinics and authored numerous manuals about disabled skiing. In 1988, PSIA voted to recognize NHSRA's Adaptive Ski Instructor Certification program.

In 1994, NHSRA was renamed Disabled Sports USA (DS/USA), now with nationwide reach. For six years Doug Pringle was a member of the United States Olympic Committee bringing focus and equality to the United States Paralympic Team and has traveled to many countries establishing Disabled Sports Programs on an International level. Doug Pringle was the President of the founding chapter, DSUSA Far West and is the current President of DSUSA Far West Division.

Today DSUSA serves over 60,000 youth, wounded warriors and adults annually in over 30 different sports, through a nationwide network of over 100 community-based chapters in 37 states. Disabilities include those with visual impairments, amputations, spinal cord injury, multiple sclerosis, head injury, cerebral palsy, other neuro-muscular/orthopedic conditions, dwarfism, autism and related intellectual disabilities. DSUSA offers over 40 different sports including alpine and Nordic skiing, snowboarding, biathlon, kayaking, water skiing, sailing, scuba, surfing, rafting, outrigger canoeing, fishing, hiking, golf, athletics, archery, cycling, running/wheeling, rock climbing, equestrian and others. These sports opportunities transform participants, highlighting the potential in each, embodied in the DSUSA motto "If I can do this, I can do anything!"

DSUSA is recognized for its pioneering role in developing physical fitness programs for people with disabilities, advocacy for and provision of adaptive programs, development of specialized equipment and its advocacy for people with disabilities in sports and recreation. It all began on snow with 13 amputee skiers who refused to be discouraged. Doug Pringle was there at the beginning.

Snowsports Builder Award

Vern Sprock

Vern Sprock, a dedicated outdoorsman, bought Sierra Ski Ranch with its two rope tows in 1953. Sierra Ski Ranch came into being as a family friendly and family operated ski area. Vern Sprock was one of the last of the area resort founders who did it his way and on his own. In the 40 years of the Sierra Ski Ranch, it was noted for its offerings of affordable family and weekend packages and a number of imaginative innovations as well. The tradition begun by Sprock was to provide a great value on legendary terrain. He and his family made an indelible imprint on snowsports.



Starting with the tows, he proceeded to expand the lift capability at the Ranch to three rope tows and two Poma lifts. The venture had trying days ahead. Caltrans required that the entire area move in 1968 due to a planned Highway 50 relocation. Successful in relocating further east on the highway, Sierra Ski Ranch reopened on Christmas Day and was immediately slammed by a record snowfall. That year was a challenge, but the area reopened in three weeks and struggled through the remainder of the season – at a loss. In 1977, the Ranch was hosting more than 300,000 snowriders annually. In the 1982-1983 season Echo Summit received 747 inches of snow, the largest recorded snowfall ever in California. This time, Sierra Ski Ranch was prepared.

The Ranch was a family operation. He moved to the Ranch in 1953 with Bobbie, his wife of three years. His daughter and son were born over the next 6 years. The four of them operated Sierra Ski Ranch in two locations and with many improvements for the next 40 years. The children had chores as early as four years and they were there when the area was sold in 1993. The four family members each had assigned responsibilities in the area's operation. Among these duties, Bobbie did a snow report each morning, one of the first areas to offer this service; she was also an official weather observation station for the National Weather Service. She was honored by the Tahoe Heritage Foundation in 2005 for her service.

Vern Sprock's last big challenge was his 1988 proposal to the USFS for a 3-phase, 10-year plan for the Sierra Ski Ranch. The proposed 1988 Huckleberry Base Area would include 11 ski lifts, 1 tram, 1 day lodge, 2 hotels, 200 condominiums, 2 service stations and other infrastructure. This project was scouted out by Vern, the USFS District Rangers and others. In the hearings and media leading up to the ultimate rescission by the USFS, local groups such as "Friends of the Echo Summit" brought the spotted owl into the discussions. There was no known outcome to a study of the owl's habitat nor a timeline for its completion. This situation, while not fatal for the ranch, made its future course indefinite. When Sprock sold to Fibreboard in 1993, the Ranch had nine chairlifts. The backcountry gates to the Huckleberry area were opened in 2001.

The Sprock family has moved on. But their four decade heart and soul investment is a testament to perseverance and a family approach to area services. Snowsports is indebted to Vern Sprock for his operation of Sierra Ski Ranch from humble beginnings in 1953, through trying times and circumstances, to 1993 when it became what we now know as Sierra at Tahoe.

Snowsports Builder Award

Arthur Chelton Leonard (1923-2011)

Arthur Chelton "Shelly" Leonard was both a ski and football athlete at Reno High School (Class of 1941) and the University of Nevada-Reno. He was most certainly headed for international ski competition when World War II changed everything. He volunteered for the U. S. Army and was ordered in 1943 to Camp Hale to train with the 10th Mountain Division. Corporal Leonard was designated as a ski instructor. This was the start of **fifty years** of service to snowsports.

At the end of the war, Leonard enrolled in the University of Oregon. Though he was proud to be called a Duck, the siren call of ski racing led him to Sun Valley Idaho in 1947. In 1948 he was



back at the University of Nevada and a member of the ski team until his graduation in 1951. The next eight years were spent as the University of Nevada ski coach. During this time he organized the first sanctioned NCAA Intercollegiate Ski Championships held at Sky Tavern, originated the "All American Ski Team", was honored as Ski Coach of the Year and led Nevada to two top five finishes in the NCAA Ski Championships. In 1992 Chelton was inducted into the University of Nevada Athletic Hall of Fame for skiing and as coach of the ski team.

In 1958, Chelton took the position of Assistant Sports Technical Director for the 1960 **Winter Olympics in Squaw Valley**. He was involved in the Competition Jury, was the Chief Gatekeeper for Alpine events and appointed Advisor to Nevada Governor Grant Sawyer for the Winter Olympics. In 1960 he was appointed Executive Director of the **National Ski Association of America** (now the United States Ski and Snowboard Association) and continued working with the **U.S. Olympic Committee** and as Chairman of the International Ski Competition Committee. Chelton returned to Reno in 1962 for two more years as Nevada's **Ski Coach**. In 1964, he accepted the position as Convention Director for John Ascuaga's Nugget until his recall to active duty military in 1967. Chelton retired from the Army as a Colonel.

His last role was Director of the Luggi Foegger Ski School at Diamond Peak, Incline Village, NV from 1975-1990. The off seasons found him selling real estate around Incline Village and Carson City. His love of sking, mountains and the Army had Chelton traveling the world with the 10th Mountain Division Association and the International Federation of Mountain Soldiers. For three years from 1995 to 1998 he served as Secretary General of "International Federation of Mountain Soldiers". He became lifelong friends with many of his former adversaries, including a German General. He also was a high school football referee in northern Nevada and Colorado for 24 years. With his son in Boy Scouts, he held positions on the Nevada Area Council Executive Committee, Scoutmaster and Explorer Post Advisor.

"Shelly" Leonard founded the 10th Mountain Division annual biathlon race and he celebrated its 28th anniversary April 19, 2009 at Auburn Ski Club. In 2007 he received the Wendell Robie Award from Auburn Ski Club for Lifetime Outstanding Service. Leonard's long career includes Certified Official, Chief of Race, Referee and Chief Timer for FWSA, United States Ski Association and the International Ski Federation (FIS).

Arthur Chelton Leonard served snowsports in many roles, especially in the Reno-Tahoe area. Snowsports owes a great debt to the late "Shelly" for his many contributions to the development of ski racing, coaching and ski instruction during skiing's growth years from the Olympics through the 1980s. Between his 10th Mountain Division duty commencing 1943 and Diamond Peak, "Shelly" Leonard participated in every major ski activity in the Reno-Tahoe area for 50 years. There may be no trail marker, but those tracks in the snow are "Shelly" Leonard's.

Board of Trustees Report

The FWSA Board of Trustees oversees the financial health of the organization and has responsibility for long-range planning to support the goals of the Association. Trustees provide the experience and leadership to plan and implement new programs, guidance for operation of functional programs, and direct oversight of the Far West Ski Association's Annual Convention, the Athletic Scholarship Program, and the Awards Program. The Trustees also recommend changes to the organizational structure and By-Laws of the Association when appropriate.

Far West Ski Association's Annual Convention is a flagship program that provides the forum for our membership and industry partners to gather together for planning, learning and celebration of all things related to snow sports. Thank you to Linda Indreboe and Dennis Heffley, leaders of Bay Area Snow Sports Council, and to all of the dedicated FWSA volunteers who have worked diligently to make the 2013 annual Convention in Reno, Nevada, a success. Thank you to our members and partners for being a part of Mountain Magic Moments!

FWSA Convention Chairman, **Jane Wyckoff**, is instrumental in convention planning and working with host councils to secure convention venues. Plans are already well underway for 2014 and 2015, and beginning for 2016. The Annual Convention is a critical part of the FWSA revenue stream to fund our programs, and long-range planning and financial control in this area is so important to our success. Thank you to VP Marketing & Sponsorship **Debbi Kor**, Silent Auction Coordinator **Mary Olhausen**, and **Sigrid Noack**, facilitator of the Travel Expo, for their industry relations activities. The *FWSA Service Awards Program* recognizes outstanding service and industry support. Catherine Ohl runs the program, and provides design and hosting services of A Cat Meowz Graphic Dezignz. FWSA Awards citations and history are available via website and electronic and US mail voting methods are supported. In addition to the exceptional web presence, Catherine edits and produces the FWSA Awards book distributed to attendees of the Annual Convention. Trustee oversight for the Service Awards Program is provided by Linda Westlund. Thanks also goes to Crissymarie King, our volunteer Chairperson of FWSA Club and Council Competitions.

Linda Coxen, FWSA Treasurer, has provided the Association with essential financial reporting and budget control. **John Reinhardt**, our Tax Advisor, prepares and files our corporate tax returns and ensures that we are in compliance with Federal and State regulations, with support and oversight from the Board of Trustees. **Robb Margrave** serves FWSA as Chairman of the **Bylaws Committee**, providing organizational leadership and guidance relating to Bylaws and Operating Procedures.

Trustee **Steve Coxen** has led FWSA into the age of Social Networking. Check out FWSA and many of our member councils and clubs on *Facebook*. We established a presence in 2010-11, and in 2012 & 2013, we improved the content and frequency of postings to better reach our diverse audience of members, prospective members, and industry partners. The first *Digital Edition of the FWSA Skiers' Guide* was introduced in 2010 and continues to gain popularity. FWSA is continuing to explore opportunities to grow our membership and that of our clubs and councils by offering information and services to current and potential members on demand via social media and mobile devices. Trustee **Linda Westlund** is leading the **Social Media Marketing** committee to advance this initiative.

Gloria Raminha and **Debbie Stewart**, with help from a group of talented and high energy volunteer "Travel Team", plan and run our North American and International Travel Programs. FWSA offers a variety of exciting, value oriented trips and adventures to our members.

Fran Long chairs the *Family & Youth Involvement Committee*. The committee has been responsible for short and long-range planning for family and youth involvement, with the objective of developing programs and services to welcome families and youth into our ski organizations. Children are welcome to attend FWSA trips and events with their parents or guardians

The 2012 – 2013 Board of Trustees has been a highly effective team. The team includes **Steve Coxen, David Krupp**, **Jane Wyckoff, Linda Westlund, Mike Sanford, Linda Coxen and Randy Lew,** supported by FWSA Secretary **Wanda Ross.** Thank you to this team, and the Board of Directors, FWSA committees, council and club volunteers for their continued outstanding efforts in making the Far West Ski Association "**THE VOICE OF THE WESTERN SKIER**".

Director Report

Bylaws Committee

The Bylaws Committee reports to the Association's Board of Directors through the Board of Trustees, which provides the committee with guidance and direction. The Committee functions as the custodian for all governing documents of the Association, recommends to the Board of Trustees and Board of Directors changes to the Bylaws and Operations Manual, and shepherds proposed changes to these documents through the approval process.

The Operations Manual was created during the period 2006 – 2008, when the Bylaws were being "streamlined". Some articles that were used to govern the Association, but not required or necessary to be stated in the Bylaws were removed and placed in a draft document referred to as the "Operations Manual". Following approval of the "streamlined" Bylaws at the 2008 Convention, the manual in its "Final Draft" form was placed on the Association's web site. At the April 2013 meeting of the Board of Directors, the Operations Manual was approved. The "Ops Manual" is a working document that will see many additions and changes over the years. In future articles of this nature, these changes will be noted and explained where necessary.

At this Annual Meeting of the Association, Delegates will be asked to approve **Proposed Amendment 2013-1**, which rewrites Article 6 of the Bylaws. A complete copy of the text of this proposed amendment is at page 36 of this Delegate Book.

Proposed Amendment 2013-1 will:

- Add clarity to the amendment process by making a distinction between proposed amendments submitted through a Voter/Delegate initiative and those that came through the Board of Trustees and Board of Directors.
- Change the lead time of all proposed amendments from 45 days to 180 days which is necessary for adequate vetting of the proposal.
- Prohibit "wordsmithing" or changing of the text after the proposed amendment has been submitted for consideration.
- Increase exposure to the membership from 30 days to 120 days.
- Change the number of endorses for proposed amendments submitted through a Voter/Delegate
 initiative, it changes the number of endorsers from five (5) to a number that is equal to 10% of the
 number of registered delegates at the most recent meeting of the Association. Proposed amendments initiated by the Board of Trustees are excused from this provision.
- Provide for withdraw of a proposed amendment.

Proposed Amendment 2013-1 to The Bylaws

This amendment will delete Articles 6.1 through 6.8 of the current Bylaws and replace them with Articles 6.1 through 6.8, shown in *Italics* below.

6.0 AMENDMENTS TO THESE BYLAWS

- 6.1. Proposed amendments to these Bylaws may be initiated by the Board of Trustees or through a Voter/ Delegate initiative and may be considered and voted upon at any Annual or Special Meeting of the Association.
- 6.2. Proposed amendments to these Bylaws shall be presented, complete and in writing, to the Association Secretary or the President/Chairman of the Board of Directors. Once submitted, no changes may be made to the proposed amendment other than to correct spelling or grammatical errors.
- 6.3. Proposed amendments to these Bylaws shall be submitted, pursuant to Section 6.2, above, at least 180 days prior to the date on which the meeting at which the proposed amendment will be considered is scheduled to begin.
- 6.4. Proposed amendments initiated through a Voter/Delegate initiative shall bear the number of verifiable signatures of Association members equaling at least 10% of the number of registered delegates at the most recent Annual Meeting of the Association. Proposed amendments initiated by the Board of Trustees are exempt from this requirement.
- 6.5. Not later than 120 days prior to the meeting at which the proposed amendment is to be considered, a written or electronically posted notice of a Proposal to Amend shall be communicated to each member club and Direct member at their last known address. The notice will include a complete copy of the proposed amendment, and the date and location of the meeting at which the proposed amendment will be considered. Information contained in the Proposal to Amend shall be published, in its entirety, on the Association web pages and/or in such publication of the Association that is regularly sent to member clubs and Direct Members.
- 6.6. Proposed amendments may be withdrawn by the initiator at any time prior to the meeting at which the proposed amendment is to be considered.
- 6.7. Approval of a proposed amendment shall require an affirmative vote of at least two-thirds (%) of the registered Delegates at the Annual or Special Meeting of the Association at which the proposed amendment is being considered.
- 6.8. Once a amendment is approved any section numbering changes will automatically change their appropriate reference in any other section of these Bylaws.

Statement in Support of Proposed Amendment 2013-1

Submitted by Linda Westlund, Chair of the Board of Trustees

I recommend a vote in favor of Proposed Amendment 2013-1, which revises section 6 of our FWSA bylaws, specifying an updated process and timeline for submission of future proposed amendments.

The lead time (6.3) for submission of proposed amendments is increased to 180 days, and timing for notification of members (6.5) is increased to 120 days. These changes provide the time required for your volunteer Board of Directors to carefully consider benefits and impacts of the proposed bylaw amendment, and for the Association's membership to form an opinion as to the worthiness of the proposal. Supporters and those opposed to the amendment will have time to more effectively organize and communicate their position to voting delegates.

Proposed amendments will be considered **as written** at time of submission (6.2), eliminating edits which risk changing the intent of the amendment or delaying presentation of the proposal to the membership. The current articles which govern amendments to bylaws allow for "wordsmithing", which has in some cases resulted in extensive edits and debates within the Board of Directors. Since proposed amendments were not being published until edits were agreed to, membership often did not see items to be voted on until 30 days prior to the convention at which the proposal was to be considered.

Proposed Amendment 2013-1 distinguishes between changes initiated by Board of Trustees action vs. Delegate initiatives, and requires that proposals submitted by the membership (6.4) demonstrate support equal to 10% of the number of Delegates at the most recent meeting of the Association. This is an increase in number of required endorsers, and is intended to ensure that proposals presented for formal vote have sufficient support by the membership. The more robust support requirement suggests that bylaw amendments brought to the membership for vote have a reasonable likelihood of approval and are worthy of the time allocated during the Annual or Special meeting at which they will be considered.

I encourage all voting delegates to carefully read and consider Proposed Amendment 2013-1. A "yes" vote will modernize Article 6, "Amendments to these Bylaws", and provide better lead time for consideration of well thought out and well written bylaws proposals for the Association.

We would especially like to recognize Dennis Heffley, BAC Council President, and Linda Indreboe, Host Council Convention Coordinator. Thanks also to Jo Simpson and the Sierra Council volunteers for assisting with our local publicity efforts. Please take a moment to refer to the Convention Volunteer VIPs list on page 13 of the Delegate Book for all the BAC and FWSA volunteers who made this Convention such a success. One of the great aspects of being an FWSA Convention Chairperson is having the opportunity to work with volunteers in a host council each year, and hope they find the experience fun, educational and rewarding! We have taken great strides in improving our registration process. The funding for athletic scholarships needs to be in available each September, and the support for women's ski jumping is needed now and until the Olympics in Sochi, Russia, in February 2014. The Westlund Fund was kicked off in his memory by Linda Westlund, his daughter, in 2012. Westlund's unit was deployed through Normandy in 1944 and participated in the Battle of the Bulge. Two FWSA directors who manage its travel programs created two different fund raising campaigns in cooperation with international travelers and the Aspen Skiing Corporation, host of the 2013 Far West Ski Week. **KUDOS to Debbie Stewart and Gloria Raminha and Aspen**, who together raised nearly \$1000 for the Westlund Fund for rehabilitation programs.

Athletic Scholarship Program

The Far West Ski Association's Athletic Scholarship Program is into its ninth year. The program was established in 2004 as a means of giving back to our sport by making a positive contribution to junior racing. United States Ski Association licensed junior racers in the U21, U18, and second year U16 classes in states represented by FWSA affiliated councils are eligible for a scholarship.

This year, junior racers in California, Nevada, Arizona, Oregon, Washington, New Mexico, Idaho, Utah and Wyoming are eligible. Scholarships are awarded on the basis of financial need, competitive accomplishments, academics, and citizenship.

North Tahoe's Lila Lapanja, U.S. Ski Team National ranking in competitive skiing can cost well in excess of \$10,000 per season; a financial challenge for even upper middle class families. In 2012, the program had sufficient funds to provide scholarships of \$500 to \$1500 to 16 junior racers, 10 women and 6 men, from California, Nevada, Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Utah. Approximately 1183 racers (686 boys and 497 girls) were eligible. The need is great and we anticipate that the number of applications will continue to increase. This year's Far West Ski Week raffle raised an impressive \$3005.00. With the generous support of this year's convention attendees, we're hopeful that we can support a record number of scholarships in 2013.

The Can Do Multiple Sclerosis Center is dedicated to improving the lives of people and families living with MS through its interactive, educational programs unique to any in the world. All of the Center's programs are based on the philosophy that you can have a chronic condition AND have your health. By drawing on a wide range of medical professionals and focusing on all aspects of health - exercise, nutrition, social support and disease management - The Center helps people with MS learn how to live healthier, happier, more active lives. The Center's motto is "Be More Than Your MS".

SUNDAY, JUNE 10, 2012

GENERAL SESSION RECONVENED

The 80th Annual Meeting and Convention of the Far West Ski Association reconvened and was called to order by President, Randy Lew, at 8:32 a.m.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

Debbie Stewart announced that last year's minutes could be found on pages 46-56 in the Delegate Handbook.

Moved Delegate #120, Debbie Stewart that the minutes be approved. Seconded by Delegate #33, Joe Harvis

Motion carried.

CREDENTIALS COMMITEE REPORT

David Krupp, VP Membership announced there are 138 voting delegates. A guorum of voting delegates was met and informed everyone how the voting process will take place.

PARLIAMENTARIAN REPORT

John Watson stated that we will be following Roberts Rule of Order. Elections process will not need any nominations to be made unless we have some nominations from the floor today.

The bylaws will require 2/3rds of voter delegates = 92 Votes. Bylaws amendment will not have any changes to the proposed amendment.

Gloria Raminha stated that she is still accepting survey cards – drawing will be at brunch today.

Robb discussed that we have one proposed bylaws amendment.

Delegates wishing to address the convention will have 1 minute to speak.

PROPOSED BY-LAW AMENDMENT

It has been proposed that Section 5.2.1 and Section 5.2.3 of the Far West Ski Association By-laws be amended as shown below. Inserted wording is shown in Blue Bold Italic print. This proposed Amendment is designated as Amendment 2012-1.

5.2.1 The elected offices of President, Secretary and Treasurer shall be for one year terms. A member may serve as President for no more than three terms.

5.2.3 The "Immediate Past President" is the individual who last completed the elected term of office as President immediately prior to the individual currently holding the office of President and shall be a member of the Board of Directors for a period of one year after succession.

MS Moved by Delegate #55, Norbert Knapp that the proposed bylaws amendment be approved.

Seconded by Delegate #3, Linda Westlund

Mike Rogers, delegate #93 spoke to the proposed amendment. Delegate #72, Jeanne Davis asked why this is addressing just the President's positions. John Watson answered her question. Del #88, John Watson addressed amendment issues and suggested that everyone study this very carefully. Del # 86, Gene Fulkerson shared his thoughts regarding the proposed amendment. Delegate #132, Karen Davis stated that she appreciated John Watson's clarification and detailed her thoughts and encouraged everyone to vote no. Del # 3, Linda Westlund stated that the proposed amendment has been thoroughly review and reiterated that the consensus of the BOD & BOT voted no, but that didn't mean that all of the board members voted the same. She did say they are in favor of clause #2 and stated that the proposed amendment was brought to the BOD at the April meeting and agreed that it needs to be studied further.

Voting results: yes votes = 23, no votes = 95

Motion did not pass.

Delegate # 2, Mike Sanford seconded the motion.

Delegation voted in favor to close the nominations.

Del # 124, Sheri Parshall spoke to the delegation about her candidacy and asked for your vote. She turned mike to Delegate #3, Linda Westlund and spoke in favor of her for the election. Del #107, Jo Simpson spoke in favor of Sheri Parshall and gave details of her experience.

Delegate #1, Randy Lew addressed the delegation and mentioned his desire to continue to grow this organization. He referred to his contract negotiation and his business skills which are strengths to lead this organization as President.

The delegates voted.

Results: Randy Lew was elected as the FWSA President.

Delegate #127, Wanda Ross moved the nominations be closed.

Delegate #30, Donn Bryant seconded the motion.

The election being uncontested, Steve Coxen announced a ballot of acclamation for Debbie Stewart.

VP of MARKETING - The nominating committee entered the name of Debbi Kor and asked for any other nominations from the floor.

Delegate #120, Debbie Stewart moved the nominations be closed.

Delegate #123, Sheri Penney seconded the motion.

The election being uncontested, Steve Coxen announced a ballot of acclamation for Debbi Kor.

VP of MEMBERSHIP – Nominating committee entered the names of George Stewart and Mary Azevedo.

Delegate #109, Dennis Heffley moved the nominations be closed

Delegate #124, Sheri Parshall seconded the motion

Mary Azevedo spoke to the group and shared her thoughts regarding VP of Membership.

George Stewart to the delegation and told them what his involvement has been with FWSA and how he would encourage direct members to be directed and involved with clubs.

The delegates voted.

Mary Azevedo was elected VP of Membership.

The elections were concluded.

Randy publicly thanked Catherine Ohl for all her work and involvement with FWSA for many years.

Randy spoke to the group about our Athletic Scholarship Program and thanked Dick Shawkey for his efforts to grow the program and building our relationship with USSA and other Associations. He talked about the US Ski Hall of Fame induction dinner held in Seattle earlier this year.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Cindy Krupp announced that a detailed Treasurer's Report is on pages 29 -32 of the Delegate Handbook and referred to the draft of the financials. She highlighted some details. The total assets as of April 30, 2012 are \$308,821 versus \$275,554 the previous year.

She pointed out the current balances in our CD's versus the prior year and noted the bottom line is a net profit of \$6,613 versus a net loss of \$4,758 the prior fiscal year. She reviewed the total expenditures detailed on page 32. She asked for any questions. Steve Coxen asked for details on the travel income vs. expenses and Cindy answered his question. She also detailed the totals regarding the convention income versus expenses.

Motion carried.

Randy introduced Travis Weber from Taos Ski Valley who sponsored our brunch. Travis thanked everyone for being involved with FWSA and invited everyone to come to Taos, NM.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

President Randy Lew reported on the accomplishments for the year and stated that we gave \$13,750 to 18 deserving junior athletes. He thanked Gloria Raminha stating that we had 375 participants in Jackson Hole for a successful 2012 Ski Week. He also commented on the 1st annual Mini Ski Week in Big White, BC lead by Fran Long & Gloria. Randy announced that Lennia Machen has stepped up the Communication Awards Program progressing us to a digital award in which the recipients can post on their website. "She has taken us into the electronic world". He thanked David Krupp, who was in charge of the Snowsports Leadership Academy (SLA) for the amazing presentations this year.

We are now working 3 to 4 conventions out and working on RFP's for 2016 & 2017.

We are working very hard on value marketing for our travel programs. He stated that group travel is no longer the least expensive way of travel. He commented that it is a balancing act to lock in less air to get better pricing based on the airline's tiered price structure and acknowledged that Gloria and her travel staff to an amazing job at this. 2013 International Ski Week March 2 to 10 – Innsbruck, Austria; Garmisch and Munich, Germany Our FWSA Int'l Ski Week March 2 – 10, 2013 in Innsbruck, Austria was a tremendous success! 86 participants spent 7 nights at the 4 star Hotel Grauer Bar which exceeded our expectation. Their overwhelming hospitality and high level of customer service was received by all. Innsbruck, the Tyrolean capital, hosted the Winter Olympics in 1964 and 1976. It has over 320 miles of trails easily accessible in 25 surrounding village resorts.

There are nine major ski areas that provided varied terrain for all levels of skiers. After returning from skiing at Axamer Lizum, Mike Sanford stated, "this was an excellent ski day with beautiful blue skies, we skied our buns off and it couldn't have been better!" Besides skiing locally, we organized ski days in St. Anton, St. Moritz and Ischgl which greatly enhanced their ski experiences. Wanda Ross commented, "It was great that you listened and acted on what our members asked you for. Skiing Ischgl was by far the best ski day ever!"

Nicholas Boekdrukker, Manager International Marketing & Media for Innsbruck Tourism arranged a welcome party for our group in the courtyard of the Historical Imperial Palace including local musical entertainment and a celebratory cup of gluwein.

Many members took advantage of our guided optional day trips. Our first excursion included stopping in the quaint town or Rattenburg, known for their plentiful glass blowing and carving artists then traveled on for a fabulous tour of the charming city of Salzburg. Director Report Public Affairs

Ski Areas Prevail in Water Rights Litigation with Forest Service. The federal district court in Colorado in December struck down a controversial U.S. Forest Service water policy that would have required resorts to transfer ownership of valuable water rights to the U.S. government without compensation. The court's decision affects 121 ski areas operating on National Forest System lands in 13 states, including Arizona, California, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Mexico, Oregon, Utah, Vermont, Washington, and Wyoming. The ruling will remove the controversial water requirement from ski area permits that were renewed in 2011 and 2012 and preclude the Forest Service from including the requirement in future ski area permits. The decision allows ski areas to continue to own and control their water for crucial ski area operations and guest services such as snowmaking, restaurants, lodging, and restrooms.

NSAA, on behalf of its member resorts, sued the U.S. Forest Service in federal court in the District of Colorado in January of this year on the basis that the agency's water clause and underlying policy violated the Administrative Procedures Act (APA), the National Forest Management Act (NFMA) and the Regulatory Flexibility Act (RFA). The court agreed with the ski industry on all three of these claims.

Ski Areas Face \$1 Billion Risk from Warming Climate, Groups Say. Declines in snowfall because of global warming are shortening the winter ski season in the U.S. and harming the economy, according to a report from two environmental groups.

In poor snow seasons, such as last winter, visits to ski areas in states such as Colorado and New York drop, and that has cost ski resorts \$1 billion in revenue over the past decade, the Natural Resources Defense Council and Protect Our Winters said in the report. The winter sports industry contributes more than \$12 billion a year to the U.S. economy, according to the study.

"Climate change spells trouble for all businesses dependent on winter weather, from snowmobiling, snowboarding, and ice fishing to snowshoeing and skiing," the groups said in the report.

Protect Our Winters Takes Climate Change Message to the White House. Protect Our Winters (POW) founder Jeremy Jones and executive director Chris Steinkamp visit Capitol Hill every year to encourage legislators to support climate change bills. But until recently, they've relied on telling the stories of athletes who have witnessed the effects of climate change or of resorts who have lost revenue as a result of unreliable snow. Last December, POW got the hard data they need to make their case even stronger to the politicians who rely on facts and numbers. Jones and Steinkamp took those numbers to the White House where Jones was honored for his work on POW.

Ski Areas Honored for Environmental Efforts. The National Ski Areas Association (NSAA) has presented seven U.S. ski areas with its 2013 Golden Eagle Awards for Environmental Excellence including Homewood Mountain Resort, Alta, Brighton, Snowbird and Solitude ski areas, Greek Peak (New York), and Killington Resort.

The annual Golden Eagle Awards, now in its 20th year, are the ski industry's most prestigious award for recognizing ski area environmental programs and projects. Awards are given based on three ski area size categories (up to 200,000 annual skier and snowboarder visits; 200,000–500,000 visits; and more than 500,000 visits).

Environment Policy Survey Lists 'Best,' 'Worst' In Resort Sustainability. The 11th annual Ski Area Citizens Coalition survey on environmental practices has Park City Mountain Resort in Utah leads the ratings. Stevens Pass Ski Area (WA), China Peak Mountain Resort (CA) and Sugar Bowl Ski Resort also got 90-plus percent scores. Heading up the bottom ratings were Homewood and Arizona Snowbowl. SIA Snow Sports Recycling Program Has Kept Over 350 Tons of Used Equipment Out of Landfills. Eventually every piece of well-loved snow sports equipment needs to be retired. In order to keep gear out of landfills and new gear on the slopes, SIA's Snow Sports Recycling Program (SSRP) recycles worn ski and snowboard gear donated by consumers and retailers.

Over four seasons, SSRP has reduced more than 350 tons of used boots, skis, boards and poles collected from Rocky Mountain retailers and resorts into grinds that can be repurposed for other snow sports products. Nationwide, 68 storefronts are participating, with most in Colorado and Salt Lake City. Over the next year, the program will expand farther west to Boise, Albuquerque and Phoenix.

Aspen Employees Fund 13 Environmental Projects. The Environment Foundation, with primary funding provided by Aspen Snowmass employees, has made the largest grant in its 16-year history, donating \$50,000 to protect 220,000 acres of Federal land from oil and gas development. The land is at Thompson Divide, outside of Carbondale, Colo. The grant is part of a total \$118,000 in donations made this spring to 13 environmental projects.

National Visit Numbers Increase in 2012-2013. The National Ski Areas Association (NSAA) announced that U.S. ski areas tallied an estimated 56.6 million skier and snowboarder visits during the 2012/13 season--the results represent an 11 percent increase over the previous season. The previous season was one of the worst in recent history, when visits totaled an estimated 51 million, a decline of 15.7 percent from the 2010/11 record total of 60.54 million, according to the Kottke National End of Season Survey. This season's numbers represent the largest year-over-year gain in 30 years.

Retail Sales Increase in 2012-2013. The SnowSports Industries America (SIA) RetailTRAK™ numbers for August - March 2012/2013 are total market projections based on data collected from the Point of Sale systems of more than 1,200 snow sports retailers. The 2012/2013 season brought in \$3.4B in retail revenues, up 3 percent compared with dollars sold during the previous season. By category, dollar sales in accessories increased 6 percent, apparel was up 3 percent and equipment sales were flat compared to the 2011/2012 season.

End to Arizona Snowbowl's Legal Battles. After years of court battles, the Arizona Snowbowl's legal battles came to an end last fall and the resort was able to launch snowmaking for the 2012-2013 ski season.

Loveland Master Plan Accepted. The U.S. Forest Service has accepted the master development plan for Loveland Ski Area, setting the outline for expansion and improvement plans for the next decade or more. Specific projects included in the plan will still be required to undergo the usual environmental approval process, but the decision indicates that the proposed developments are aligned with the Forest Service's resource management plan. Among the elements of the plan are improvements to the beginner experience, upgrades to improve circulation between the two sections of the resort, which is bisected by U.S. 6, and the potential for initiating backcountry guide services and facilities.

Telluride Drops World Cup, Buys Hotel. In a sign of changing priorities, Telluride Ski and Golf Company will no longer host a pre-Christmas FIS World Cup Ski and Snowboard event, and has bought a boutique hotel in town. Telluride executive vice president Jim Mikula said that the World Cup event consumes a lot of resources and energy at a time when the resort is also trying to get ready for the holiday crowds, and that the event creates a relatively small return on that investment.

Mammoth Plots New Future for June. June Mountain is set to reopen next December after a year in mothballs. The resort will continue to target families and entry-level skiers and snowboarders, with tentative plans for lift and snowmaking upgrades down the road.

"Next winter we look forward to bringing skiers and snowboarders a great on-mountain experience while also planning for June's future, including the possibility of a new lift and enhanced snowmaking," June Mountain general manager Carl Williams said in a release.

CEO Rusty Gregory of Mammoth Mountain, which owns June, told attendees at the national meeting of the North American Snowsports Journalists' Association (NASJA) that the company will invest \$6 million in a new chairlift for June once the necessary permits are acquired.

Historic Timberline Lodge Enters Pantheon Of Historic Hotels. The National Trust for Historic Preservation has announced that the famed ski lodge on the shoulder of Mt. Hood had been accepted onto its list of Historic Hotels of America.

Utah's Proposed SkiLink Gets Lots of Noise at Public Forum. There are more than a few entities who would like to put the kibosh on SkiLink. The unorthodox idea is to transport Utah skiers from Canyons Resort in Park City to Solitude Mountain Resort in Big Cottonwood Canyon via a gondola. While it sounds good on paper, a noisy crowd showed up at a public forum in Park City to protest the project.

Breckenridge OK'd For Peak 6 Expansion; 23 Percent More Terrain. Skiers and snowboarders who call Breckenridge their home resort can expect another boost in terrain next season. The proposed development of Peak 6, the resort's fifth mountain, has weathered the U.S. Forest Service approval process and recently received a final go-ahead after an appeal period ended in November 2012.

Although more litigation has been threatened, the Forest Service decision appeared solid enough for the resort to make a definitive commitment to getting Peak 6 operating in the 2013-2014 season.

Mt. Bachelor Gets OK for Expansion. Mt. Bachelor has received the go-ahead from the Forest Service for an improvement project that will take place over the next 10 years. Included in the plan are expansions to terrain, three new lifts, a lodge expansion, new hiking trails, a lift-served downhill bike park, a zipline course and rock climbing structure. Also on the drawing board is the construction of a biomass co-generation facility that will provide electrical power and steam heat.

Whistler Blackcomb Plans \$18 Million Lift Upgrade. Whistler Blackcomb has unveiled capital plans for an \$18 million lift expansion. Whistler Mountain's Harmony detachable quad chairlift will be replaced with a new Doppelmayr detachable six-pack. Blackcomb will replace a fixed-grip triple in the Crystal Zone with a high-speed quad.

Homewood Expansion Plan to get Further Review. Homewood Mountain Resort's expansion plan has been put on hold temporarily. U.S. District Judge William B. Shubb ruled that Placer County and the Tahoe Regional Planning Agency approved the Homewood plan without considering whether a smaller (and less environmentally impactful) project would suffice, as required by law.

Crested Butte Produces New Master Plan. Crested Butte Mountain Resort has submitted a new Master Development Plan to the U.S. Forest Service. The plan incorporates previous approvals at the main mountain, along with adjacent private land development projects, new proposals for terrain outside the resort's existing permit area on Crested Butte, and a much-reduced proposal for Snodgrass Mountain, which has been the source of controversy (and rejected proposals) in the past.

Northstar Submits Master Plan for Environmental Review. Northstar, California, has released its Mountain Master Plan (NMMP), outlining what the future holds with regard to on-mountain improvements and additional recreational opportunities at the resort. The plan, submitted to Placer County for environmental review, outlines mountain improvements proposed at Northstar over the next 10 to 15 years. The Northstar Mountain Master Plan proposes new ski terrain, lifts, skier facilities and additional recreational opportunities, as well as upgrades to existing ski terrain and facilities.

Google Adds 38 Ski Slopes to Google Maps App. The Google Maps app, available for free on Android devices and iPhone, now includes 38 new maps of ski runs and lifts from some of the most popular ski resorts in the United States and Canada.

The first Council Challenge was held in Mt. Bachelor when the Bay Area Council challenged the Northwest Council (then known as Portland Area Ski Club Council) to a duel race. Teams consisted of the best 6 racers from each council. In Steamboat the Challenge was opened up to all councils. In a surprise move, Arizona beat out Northwest, Bay Area and Los Angeles. Today teams consist of 8 racers from each council and must be a mix of men and women. And if you can't beat them on the course, wear an interesting costume to race in.

Racer of the Week

Awarded to the female and male racer who earns the most points for the Slalom and Giant Slalom races at ski week. This award is administered by the Far West Ski Association's Ski Week Staff.

Far West Championships

Awarded to the Far West race league that earns the most points overall at the Far West Championships. The Far West Racing Association administers this award.

Roma McCoy Trophy

Awarded to the Far West race league that earns the most points per racer start at the Far West Championships. The Far West Racing Association administers this award.

Committee Report Family and Youth Involvement

Committee Report Safety

Having fun without injury is what safety is all about. It is also about anticipating potential problems. The ski industry has taken great measures to insure an excellent and safe experience at the ski resorts. All snow sports participants can appreciate how critically important safety is to all of us.

Many are aware of deaths occurring at ski areas each year. Deaths are often the result of skiers/riders going too fast and striking an object. There is little doubt that in each person has to set their own standards of what they consider to be conscientious and prudent behaviors. It requires a constant attention to the hazards and potential hazards around us.

Our sports take place in ski areas which do a great job at controlling many things which could cause us harm. Excessive speed, inattentiveness, and failure to look around are some of the main causes for injuries. Issues of safety are both relevant to the ski industry and very important to the Association.

The position of Safety Chair was created in the fall of 2002, with two-time Safety Person of the Year winner ('01&'02) **Richard Lubin, D.C.,** as chair. Mike Sanford and Dr. Lubin drafted a new Committee Charter, Mission Statement and Objectives.

The Association promotes safety by a number of methods.

- There is a special section of the website (**FWSA.org**) with articles on safety.
- In our annual FWSA SKIER'S GUIDE, publication, the widely distributed magazine.
- The Association's quarterly newsletter, *The Councilman*, has featured articles on safety by Dr. Lubin and others.
- Our Safety Chair has interacted with a number of Risk Managers and Ski Patrollers at the Ski Resorts to discuss issues of Safety.
- The Safety Chair has regularly emailed original articles to many websites and newsletters.
- Our slogans— "Ski With Pride, Let It Ride, Watch All Sides" and <u>First With Safety Awareness appear in</u> many places letting all know that safety is an important issue with the Association.
- Our **Safety Person of the Year** Contest brings greater exposure to our concerns and dedication to safety in snow sports.

Safety Person of the Year

Starting in 1999 the FWSA has been awarding a Safety Person of the Year to the individual within the Association that has done the most to promote safety through a number of criteria. This contest has been sponsored by **AS-PEN SKIING COMPANY**. They have announced that they will continue sponsorship. While every ski resort promotes safety, Aspen has proven their dedication to making safety an important issue by rewarding these individuals with a fabulous ski vacation. This includes a 7-day package for 2 including airfare, 6 nights lodging, 6 days of lift tickets, rental equipment, lessons, a mountain tour with an employee, and an appearance on the local TV show. **We would like to encourage members to participate in safety activities and enter the contest**.

Safety Thermometers

Recent years have seen the introduction of our FWSA Safety Thermometers. These 11 inch dial thermometers have the Far West Ski Association logo, Website, and the slogan "Be Safe. Watch All Sides". The Safety chair ensured that these were placed at Heavenly, Squaw, Northstar, Sugar Bowl and Sierra at Tahoe.

Some of the other board members placed these in other resorts like Aspen and Telluride. Next year we hope to have a new batch of thermometers.

Resorts

The ski resorts take great measures to ensure that skiing and snowboarding can be a safe sport. Every aspect of a ski resort is predicated on safety. If there is any question about these issues, they will close a lift or an area. Long before a ski area is open, the patrollers check the slopes. Issues like avalanche danger, lifts, marking obstacles, padding lift towers, marking out of bounds, and grooming are among the many safety concerns. Most resorts have a Risk Manager to address some of these concerns. Each ski area has its own unique set of concerns. "The Skiers Responsibility Code", which outlines safe practices, is displayed prominently at nearly every US resort on posters, on napkins and in restrooms. Ski patrollers issue warnings and sometimes pull the passes of those who demonstrate unsafe practices. We ultimately recognize that the issue of safety is most dependent on each individual's own cognizance.

We applaud the efforts of some of the national programs like **Burrton's Smart Style**, **the National Ski Area Association's** (NSAA) **Heads Up** Safety Program, **Lids on Kids**, and **Safety Awareness Week**.

Equipment manufacturers have contributed to increased safety in skiing. Material science and improved design have helped to bolster the numbers of safe snow sport participants. Certainly the advances in fabric technology have made snowsports more safe and warm. Ski and snowboard manufacturing is constantly evolving, as have binding and boot production. These aspects all affect safety and we try to stay current on these changes.

Most recently the safety chair has written articles on some of the new technology of Heads-up Display goggles and how they may affect safety. Cell phones, texting, music players are all recent technologies that can take away attentiveness from safety. Another recent article in the *Skier's Guide* has raised questions regarding the safety of marijuana usage and skiing.

Terrain Parks

There has been a large industry push to provide parks and terrain feature. Since a disproportionate number of injuries take place in these regions it has been a great safety concern.

Some of the discussions have focused on making these parks safer. One of the strategies is to have multiple areas for skiers/riders of different ability levels. Burton Progression Parks, developed by Burton and Snow Park Technologies bring small features to an area and have progressively bigger terrain features. This way skiers/riders can start small and work their way up. Four or more separate park areas may be provided at the larger resorts giving the public a great choice in diversity and intensity. A beginner snowboarder is less likely to get hurt if they have a choice for a smaller, less dangerous park. The larger, more extreme features attract those of a higher skill level.

There is little doubt that the trend for freestyle has attracted many to skiing and boarding and this trend will likely continue. We at FWSA believe it is a good and safe practice to use wrist supports and helmets. Other safety gear, like padded shorts, or shoulder pads may also help decrease injury. Rely on your skills, let the features clear before going, and use a spotter if possible.

Education and safety in these park areas will decrease the risks, however we expect people to continue to injure themselves. Burrton's Smart Style is a sensible approach. Respect the other people, look before you leap, and easy style it. It promotes rational incremental increases in ability.

Conclusion

Skiing and snowboarding present the most risks ultimately to the individual user Like driving, one has to use common sense and ski or ride defensively, watching and anticipating all possible dangers.

At all FWSA conventions, safety has remained a major issue. FWSA has continued to focus its efforts on promoting safe snow sport practices. The Far West Ski Association takes an active role in promoting safety. We have teamed with Aspen/Snowmass in giving a fantastic award for many years. Through our other methods we are leaders and proponents of safe snow sports.

The Safety Chair has developed a new slogan: SAFETY IS.....THINKING FIRST!



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


