Colorado Native and Snow Sports Hall of Fame Inductee Chris Anthony is a professional skier who has been on skis since he was eighteen months old. He has competed in almost every discipline of the sport.

He made his way up the international ranks of alpine ski racing before switching over to big mountain freeride competitions, formally known as extreme skiing competitions.

During the offseason, Chris raced road bikes professionally for one of the top continental teams. Both sports allowed him to spend time at the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs where he was exposed to Exercise Physiology. He would later study this subject at the University of Colorado and receive a Bachelor of Science degree.

During college Chris was recruited by Warren Miller Films to ski in one of the annual films. The opportunity inspired Chris to write a screenplay and eventually study film and writing while interning for Michael Douglas at Paramount Studios and attending the University of Southern California in Los Angeles for a period of time.

During the winter months, for more

than 28 years, Chris continued to travel as an athlete, host and emcee for Warren Miller Films (Now Warren Miller Entertainment) building his brand. He is known for outlandish ski film assignments in strange locations.

During his career Chris has freelanced for several publications, coauthored a guidebook, was commissioned to write a screenplay, and hosted and produced several television and segment projects.

Chris has been booked for hundreds of speaking engagements, and formed a consulting and guide business.
He has volunteered thousands of hours for several charitable organizations, raising over a million dollars on their behalf prior to building his own youth outreach program called the Chris Anthony Youth Initiative Project. https://www.chrisanthony.com/youth-initiative-project.

In I991, Chris was appointed Youth Ambassador for the State of Colorado by Governor Roy Romer. This sent Chris on a cultural exchange to the prefecture of Yamagata, Japan.
In 1997, Chris was appointed to the Colorado Speakers Bureau, placing him in front of a number of Fortune 500 companies.
A year later in 1998, Colorado Ski Country named Chris the spokesperson for their 5th and 6th Grade Passport Program. The Passport Program served as a platform for him to design his own youth mentoring program now operating under the guidance of the Colorado

Nonprofit Development Center.
In 2013, Chris was inspired by a mentor to create a 501 (c)(3) foundation to honor his desire to impact youth.
One of his prouder moments was receiving the 2014 St. Jude Children's Hospital Sarah Burke Spirit Award for his work with youth.
His most powerful resource came from his position as a professional skier, through which he has engaged with more than 85,000 students over 20-plus years through school programs and other educational outlets.
Since the creation of his Youth Project as a fiscal partner of the Colorado Nonprofit Development Center in 2013, Chris has been able to take his mission to the next level. He has expanded his programming and now offers financial aid in select situations to ensure a broad spectrum of students can participate in his educational offerings.
More recently Chris expanded his Youth Project by underwriting snow science and avalanche education for youth and is currently working on an educational documentary.

In 2014 the Governor of Colorado endorsed the Project with this statement: "Colorado has always led the way in quality of life, fitness, adventure and outdoors. The Chris Anthony Youth Initiative Project has taken the unique outdoor assets we have across the state and created a program that will further enhance youth education," said John Hickenlooper, then Colorado Governor and current United States Senator.

## Bruce K. Campbell

## World War II 10th Mountain Division Veteran

Bruce Campbell was born and raised in Los Angeles and attended local schools. He graduated from the University of California Los Angelas after having his education interrupted by World War II.

He joined the 10th Mountain Division and received intense mountain warfare training at Camp Hale, Colo. The training included skiing, rock climbing and working with mules at altitudes of more than I3,000 feet. The training took place during summer and during winter in deep snow on skis and snowshoes.

The training then moved to Camp Swift, Texas, for flat-land exercises where he was a Staff Sgt. in charge of two squads of 81 mm mortars, which proved valuable in mountain combat.

In December 1944, he left the U.S. aboard the SS Argentina, arriving in Naples, Italy, two days before Christmas. His unit journeyed north to engage

the German mountain troops in the Northern Appennines where the famous Riva Ridge battle took place.

It was followed by intense combat through the rest of the German strongholds. Next they traveled across the Po Valley and River where they liberated the city of Verona.

Their next and final objective was Lake Garda in the Italian Alps. A fierce struggle occurred with the 3rd Battalion, leading the U.S. forces on the east side of Lake Garda through a series of cliffside tunnels, ultimately taking over the towns of Torbole and Riva where the war ended for them in Italy May 2, 1945.

The entire division was then deployed to northeast Italy in the area of the Julian Alps. This event is covered in detail in the film Mission Mt. Mangart, a documentary filmed and produced by Chris Anthony.

His unit left Italy in late July I945, aboard a victory ship contemplating a 30-day leave in the U.S. and then to invade Japan. It was not a happy thought, but the rest is history.

He returned home and back to UCLA. After graduation he became an insurance broker until retiring in 1986.

He spent about 10 years with a Swiss associate in waste disposal technology, especially with scrap tires. During this period he was a member of the Screen Actors Guild - American Federation of Television and Radio Artists, working with an agent for on-camera commercials and voiceovers. He became a member of the Barbershop Harmony Society and participated in weekly re-

hearsals until Covid-I9 hit.
He is an active member of the Grindelwald Ski Club where he is a charter member of the club that formed in 1949.

He is very active in the 10th Mountain Foundation and is awaiting the restart of Barbershop Harmony rehearsals and performances, as well as voiceover auditions in his home studio.
We will be celebrating Bruce's 97th birthday at the convention on Saturday.

## Howard Koch

## World War II 10th Mountain Division Veteran



Howard Koch was born in Oakland, Calif., and learned to ski at Sugar Bowl when he was 13. He attended the University of California Berkley after graduating from high school at 16 .

The country was in the midst of World War II and the military was advertising for volunteers who could ski and rock climb to join a division that at the time was called the Ski Troops. Later they were designated as the IOth Mountain Division.

In March 1943, just after turning 18, Howard volunteered and petitioned to join the Ski Troops.

He was sent to Camp Hale in Colorado, built to house 14,000 men and 4,000 mules for packing equipment. Vehicles couldn't go in the snow and mountains in which they were training so the mules were an essential part of their mission.

Howard was assigned to the 86th Mountain Regiment, Second Battalion Headquarters.

The Germans had multiple trained mountain divisions and the United States had none until the formation of the 10th Mountain Division.

They were sent to Camp Swift in Texas so they could add Heavy Weapons Companies to their three regiments. While at Camp Swift, Howard entered Officers Candidate School. After graduation he returned to the IOth Mountain Division as they were being sent to Italy.

The 86th Mountain Infantry Division arrived in the Bay of Naples in January 1945, and they made their way up the boot of Italy in coastal steamers and railroad box cars.

They headed to dislodge the Germans defending Mount Belvedere, a position along the Gothic Line, a heavily fortified and defended line that the Germans built in the mountainous region which stretched east to west across Northern Italy above Florence.

As part of the 10th Mountain's assault on Mount Belvedere, a German artillery observation outpost on Mount Serrasiccia (sometimes called Riva Ridge) would have to be taken because it could direct German artillery onto the main assault against Mount Belevedere.

On February 17, 1945, Howard and his platoon were taken by truck to north of Poretta Terme for an evening hike into the canyon of the Torrente Dardagna, 2,000 feet below their objective, the German observation post on Riva Ridge.

In darkness early the next morning Howard and his platoon of 36 men arrived at the bottom of the Dardagna Canyon and entered a home where they hid out of site from the Germans for the next 18 hours. At 7:30 pm they departed to start the arduous climb up the steep Riva Ridge with at least 160 men climbing the one route in total darkness.

After climbing for 10 hours they approached the top at about 5:30 am, A dense fog covered the top of the ridge and allowed them to dig their fox holes and gun positions without being detected.

Howard's company advanced to discover that the Germans were unaware of their presence and were sleeping in several dugouts. His group opened a dugout door and Howard ordered them to come out with their hands up. About 60 Germans in that dugout the surrendered. The unit's assault on Riva Ridge was a total surprise to the Germans and it was captured without firing a shot.

After the prisoners were sent away the unit prepared for a German counterattack. The attack began the next day after the Germans discovered their presence. This was his first time under
fire and experiencing his company taking casualties. The successful attack on Riva Ridge enabled the attack on Mount Belvedere to succeed.
Howard and the IOth Mountain Division continued to battle the Germans up on the mountain tops and in the valleys of Northern Italy all the way up to the Po River Valley and Lake Garda.

After some bitter fighting in this region, the German Southeastern Austrian Command surrendered on May 2, 1945. Six days later Germany surrendered ending the war in Europe.
In July, Howard and his company returned to the United States to begin amphibious training in preparation to land on North Tokyo Beach. After returning to Norfolk the first atomic bomb was dropped on Japan. The second bomb was dropped on Nagasaki while Howard was on leave before reporting to Camp Carson to prepare for Japan and the war ended.

After being released from the Army in Mayl946, Howard joined the Army Reserve and returned to the University of California Berkley where he graduated in 1948 with a degree in accounting.

After graduation and marriage to his wife Averil (to whom he was married for 72 years), Howard went to work for Burrows selling accounting machines.

In August of 1950 Howard was recalled to active duty for the Korean War. On a stopover in Japan enroute to Korea he was in Japan to oversee projects ongoing in postwar Japan. He was again released from the Army in February 1952 and he returned to Oakland.


## Tom Rice

## World War II Veteran



Staff Sergeant Thomas M. Rice fought in several of the major battles of World War II, including Normandy, MarketGarden, and the Battle of the Bulge. He made combat jumps at Normandy and Market-Garden.

As a paratrooper, Tom Rice was one of 13,000 who parachuted into France on D-Day, June 6, 1944, the night that turned the corner for the Allies in World War II. He was with the IOI st

Airborne Division, the "Screaming Eagles," parachuting behind enemy lines.

In Normandy Tom was wounded by shrapnel and caught a sniper's bullet in his left knee. He also made a flight jump in Holland during Operation Market Garden in Sept 1944, and the Battle of the Bulge from Dec. 1944 to Jan. 1945. He was seriously injured in Bastogne during the Battle of the Bulge and other bullets tore a four-inch piece of the

## Gil Nadeau

## World War II Veteran



Gil Nadeau served in the Navy during World War II in the Pacific from 19441946. He served as a visual signalman aboard an LCS, which at that time stood for Landing Craft Support, and was part of the "Mighty Midgets." He served in the Philippines, the invasion of Borneo and in Okinawa.

Gil's awards include the Pacific Asiatic Theater Medal/Ribbon with 2 stars, American Theater Medal/Ribbon, the China Theater Medal/Ribbon, Good Conduct Medal/Ribbon, Philippine Liberation Medal/Ribbon, Philippine Independence Medal/Ribbon, China War Memorial Medal/Ribbon, WWII Occupation (Japan) Medal/Ribbon, WWII Victory Medal/Ribbon, and Combat Action Ribbon and Navy Unit Commendation.
radial just below his right elbow. His last combat experience of WWII took place in Berchesgaden, Austria.
His military awards include four campaigns, Purple Heart with two Oak Leaf clusters, Two Invasion Arrows, Combat Infantry Badge, Bronze Star with cluster, Good Conduct Medal, French Fourregue, Belgium Lanyard and Parachutist Badge.
After the war, he taught social studies for 44 years at Chula Vista and Hilltop High Schools. Tom continues speaking to school students and civic organizations about his WWII experiences.
He continues to do tandem jumps each year on his birthday as a way to honor those who never came home from the war.

Tom has returned to Normandy and Market Garden numerous times and jumped for their 75th Anniversaries in 2019.

Tom celebrated his 100th birthday by jumping out of the Commemorative Air Force Inland Empire Wing Day Doll Aug 15 in Coronado.

Gil speaks at numerous engagements, schools and participates in many local activities to honor our WWII Veterans.

He is known to many as the "shortest sailor with the tallest tales".


## Andre Chappaz

## World War II Veteran

Andre Chappaz was born in San Francisco but was raised in France until he returned to San Francisco with his parents at 12 years old.

Andre was an art student living in San Francisco when he was called to serve in the war. When he left for the South Pacific as a member of the Army Corps of Engineers, he took his pencils, pens and drawing paper with him.

Chappaz spent four months in Guam, eight months on Okinawa and 72 days at sea, chronicling his experience in about 100 drawings. He also helped to build airfields for B-29 bombers on the Mariana Islands and Ryukus.


While on Okinawa, he was part of the IOth Army that was staging for the invasion of Japan. Hokkaido was designated as the unit's landing area.

His assignments included: locating mines and unexploded ordinance in areas that were designated for airfield construction, providing protection to the bulldozer operators by riding as an armed guard on the equipment and participating in patrols in Japanese held areas. He was detailed to locate, establish and protect a water pipeline to one of the air bases through Japanese held area.

Chappaz says "I was young and impressionable, so I drew things that impressed me about the daily life of the soldiers. I drew about the life of my buddies as I went along. Later on, I got my mother to send me some colored pencils."

His pen and ink illustrations include scenes of his comrades on patrol in the jungle, taking part in special missions and discovering land mines on the beaches of Guam. Most of his depictions were drawn from memory, as he was largely unable to draw in the field. Tech 5 Chappaz's awards include:


Good Conduct Medal, American Defense Medal, Asiatic Pacific (with 2 bronze service stars), WWII Victory Medal, Japanese Occupation Medal, Marksman Badge (M-I Rifle) and Meritorious Service Patch.
After the war, Andre returned to Art School on the GI Bill. He then worked as an advertising artist working in design and illustrations. At 95 years old, he does not plan on slowing down! He still downhill skis every winter and belongs to a local biking club.

## Shawn Styles

Television Broadcaster 2021 Bill Berry Hard News Award Recipient

# Skiing Sun Valley: a History from Union Pacific to the Holdings 



Skiing Sun Valley: a history from Union Pacific to the Holdings, published by The History Press in 2020, is an in-depth history of the country's first destination ski resort where modern skiing in this country began. The book authored by John Lunden includes more than I80 historic photos from a variety of sources.

It tells previously untold stories from original Union Pacific documents, oral histories of individuals involved with the resort from its beginning, and histories of Union Pacific and the Harriman family.

The book discusses the history of Sun Valley, the country's first destination ski resort, built in 1936 by Averell Harriman and Union Pacific in the wilds of Central Idaho for \$1.5 million. Harriman intended to regenerate rail passenger traffic that had been decimated by the Great Depression.

The resort was designed to bring European ambiance to the U.S., and was called America's St. Moritz. Sun Valley had an ultra-modern lodge with big city amenities, a ski school with Austrian instructors that made skiing sexy, and chair lifts invented by Union pacific en-
gineers based on a system to load bananas onto boats.
Skiing Sun Valley explores Sun Valley's relationship with Averell Harriman and the Union Pacific Railroad, Harriman's personal involvement with virtually every decision made about the resort, and how its role was governed by railroad economics. It demonstrates how Harriman used ski tournaments to make Sun Valley an international resort.

Skiing Sun Valley explores the unique history of our first destination ski resort that introduced modern skiing to this country. Developed as an economic asset of the Union Pacific Railroad, Sun Valley became a cultural icon and influenced many other ski resorts' developed afterwards.

The book is based on previously unpublished sources about Union Pacific, Sun Valley and the people who developed it and made it famous.
Ski racer and author Dick Dorworth in his review of the book in Skiing History magazine said the following: "Skiing Sun Valley is a deeply researched, scholarly book about the connections between the Sun Valley of today and the people, places, cultures, economics, wars, inventions, wilderness, ecology, risks and personal relationships in the 19th and 20th centuries that made it what it will be in the 21 st.
"Every aspect of the story is accompanied by an abundance of photos that on their own are worth the price of the book. Every person with a connection to and love of Sun Valley will be better informed, inspired and wiser after reading it."

During the Covid-I9 quarantine period John Lunden also published two other books about ski history: Sun Valley, Ketchum \& the Wood River Valley and Ski Jumping in Washington State: a Nordic Tradition, which is a companion book to an exhibit on ski jumping at the Nordic Museum that he helped prepare.


He also wrote Early Skiing on Snoqualmie Pass that was published in 2017. It and Sun Valley, Ketchum \& the Wood River Valley received Skade awards from the International Skiing History Association.

John was born and raised in Seattle. He received B.A and J.D. degrees from the University of Washington and a Master of Urban and Regional Planning from The George Washington University.
He practiced law in Washington, D.C. and Seattle as a federal attorney and as a private practice trial attorney in federal court.

In Richard's words, "For any change to occur, the first step is to inform people of the problem." Richard's goals were to disseminate information about the problem, and to give the reader or viewer tools to take action regarding protecting our environment.

## Bill Berry Award-Feature Article Jimmy Petterson <br> "Skiing Around the World, Vol II"



Jimmy Petterson has been named the winner of the Far West Ski Association's Bill Berry Award (Featured Articles) for 202 I for his book, Skiing Around the World Volume II.

Named after longtime and renowned ski journalist, Bill Berry, the award celebrates outstanding contributions to skiing by the media.

It is not the first time that this honor has been bestowed on Petterson. In 2006, he also was the recipient of the Berry Award when he published Volume I of Skiing Around the World.

As one might be able to surmise from the I5-year interim between the awards, these books - more like tomes - are not the sorts of works that one can throw together quickly.

In fact, Petterson has skied 650 ski resorts in 75 countries and all seven continents to amass the information and photos that make up his twovolume seminal work.

When he was informed about winning the award, Petterson was extremely
happy. He states: "The long process of creating a document of this kind has given me many rewards along the way, and I might add that 'the way' has been a long and winding ski slope. My initial reward has been the many wonderful mountains and ski resorts that I have been able to visit and ski while working on this almost-never-ending project.
"And of course, there have been innumerable kind people that I have met on the snow during the process. Travel is always a reward unto itself.
"Another reward has been the creative process. I have very much enjoyed weaving my experiences into a series of interesting stories. I have gotten great pleasure out of my photography work and have made some great friends with skiers who have helped me by modeling for the photos. In addition, I have also enjoyed working extensively with the layout for the book.
"Now, after working about I5 years on Volume II, I'm very pleased and honored to have received the recognition
of my peers in the ski industry who have chosen me once more to receive the Bill Berry Award.
Petterson continues, "Still, I don't want to forget one more reward of my many years of work - the many skiers and boarders who have written me to tell me how my books have inspired them to embark on exotic ski travels of their own, visiting destinations that they first read about in one of my books. To be able, in some small way, to enhance the lives of other people is also something that I am very proud of and happy for."

In addition to his two books on skiing, Jimmy has had more than 650 feature articles published, and his work has appeared in 20 countries. He is also an annual contributor to the Far West Skier's Guide.

Each of Petterson's books also won the Harold Hirsch Award given out by the North American Snowsports Journalists Association, and Volume II also was honored with the Baldur Award from the International Ski History Association.

Volume I of Skiing Around the World, which had for many years been sold out, has been reprinted and is currently available again. Both books, as well as, a number of other items produced by Mr. Petterson, can be purchased from his website:

The builder may be honored for achievements in athletics, the press, publishers, historians, industry, humanitarian work, area development, or technology. In short, they honor those who have made significant contributions to snowsports.

## Schone Malliet

Schone Malliet has devoted many years of service to the sport of skiing and he has introduced hundreds of urban children to our sport.

He is the CEO and founder of Winter4Kids (W4K) at the National Winter Activity Center in Vernon, NJ. W4K was developed out of an initiative of the National Winter Sports Education Foundation, a national non-profit whose mission is to improve the lives, health and fitness of youth through winter activities by leading the collaboration of several nationally recognized partner organizations.

The Center introduces children to activities that they would not typically be exposed to or consider trying, while making it economically feasible.

Winter4Kids exists to create healthy lifestyles and influence behaviors of youth through winter activities. Better health and attitudes are the result of increased moderate to vigorous activity, nutritious food, and personal development.

The Center states that lives are changed and outlooks are brighter as
each of their participants become better individuals through the mastery of snow and life skills. The youth use these experiences to explore and pursue new academic, life and sport opportunities.

The program includes wholesome meals, fitted gear and six weeks of lessons, typically held on weekends,

According to Schone, "This isn't a program - this is a movement. I enjoy the impact The Center has on kids who participate and the potential to change their lives forever."
The Center served 180 children in its first year of operation. In 2018, more than I,400 kids came through the program. The projection is to serve 10,000 children by 2022.
Schone has a BA in Economics from Holy Cross College and an MBA from Pepperdine University. He has a broad set of accomplishments to draw upon from family, military, athletic and corporate environments, as a Marine pilot, alpine ski racing coach, CEO of ViaNovus, alyXsys Inc, and senior sales and marketing executive.


He was the Chair and Founder of the National Winter Sports Education Foundation. Schone is currently a Vice President of the Holy Cross Alumni Association board; former Chair, YMCA Board of Managers, he and is involved in many facets of winter sports through US Ski and Snowboard.
Shone's dedication to exposing urban children to the sport of skiing makes him a true Snowsports Builder.

## Board of Trustees Report

The FWSA Board of Trustees oversees the financial health of the organization and has responsibility for long-range planning to support the goals of the Association. Trustees provide the experience and leadership to plan and implement new programs, guidance for operation of functional programs, and direct oversight of the Far West Ski Association's Annual Convention, the Athletic Scholarship Program, and the Awards Program. The Trustees also recommend changes to the organization's structure and By-Laws of the Association when appropriate.

The FWSA Board of Trustees is comprised of four elected Trustees: Tom Bundgard, Tucker Hoffmann, Jo Simpson and me as Trustee Chair. President Gloria Raminha, Past President Steve Coxen, and Treasurer, Randy Lew also serve as Trustees, and Secretary Sheri Parshall provides support.

Elected Trustees typically serve two-year terms, with two of four positions open for election each year at the Annual Convention. With the 2020 Annual Meeting canceled due to COVID, and the 2021 Annual Meeting postponed from June to October, all Trustees agreed to continue in their roles until the October 2021 Election of Officers. Four Trustees will be elected, two for eight-month terms, two for one-year, eight-month terms.

FWSA was presented with many challenges in 2020 and 2021. Debbie Stewart was leading a group of international travelers in Portugal in March 2020, when US and worldwide travel restrictions were rapidly implemented. Debbie heroically got everyone home safely.

FWSA Trustees and our Directors of Travel, Debbie Stewart and Nancy Ellis, canceled, rescheduled and renegotiated contracts for many trips. The March 2020 Mini Ski Week to Big White, British Columbia, Canada, was canceled with no financial penalty to FWSA or our members. The International Ski Week to Sölden Austria was moved from 202I to 2022. The 2020 Cozumel dive trip was canceled. The 2020 trip to Croatia was rescheduled for September 2022. The 202I Mini Ski Week to Zermatt Utah was rescheduled to March 2022. The 202I Sun Valley North American trip was safely conducted with 103 attending a fun ski week at which group events were modified to conform to COVID restrictions. Refer to the Treasurer's Report to review the 2020 \& 202I Travel Program Financials, which were favorable.

Far West Ski Association's Annual Convention is a flagship program that provides a forum for our membership and industry partners to gather together for planning, learning and celebration of snowsports. FWSA Trustees and Debbi Kor, FWSA Convention Chairperson, renegotiated contracts and rescheduled the 2020 and 2021 Annual Conventions. NWSCC convention chair Sheri Parshall worked with us to move the June 2020 convention in Portland, Oregon, to June 2022. The 202 I convention was originally planned for June 2021 in San Diego, and SDCSC convention chair Chris Gill worked with us to reschedule to October 2021. The Annual Convention is a critical part of the FWSA revenue stream to fund our programs. Convention financials depend on attendance by delegates and Silent Auction attendees, which is being unfavorably affected by COVID.

The FWSA Awards Program includes Service Awards, Industry Awards, Media Awards, and the Snowsports Builder Award, recognizing individuals for their exceptional contributions. Thank you to Steve Coxen who chairs this program, and to Joe Harvis, Director of FWSA Communications, who provided technical support for publishing citations and administering voting via our new FWSA Club Express Website which was deployed in early 2020.

Randy Lew, FWSA Treasurer, provides the Association with detailed, timely, and accurate financial reporting and budget control. John Reinhardt, our Tax Advisor, prepares and files our corporate tax returns and ensures that we are in compliance with Federal and State regulations, with support and oversight from the Board of Trustees.

# Athletic Scholarship Program

The Far West Ski Association Athletic Scholarship Program is entering its 18th year, growing from an initial $\$ 1,500$ in scholarships in 2004 to $\$ 12,150$ and 18 recipients in seven race training programs in the 2020-202I season.
The total awarded since the program's inception is now $\$ 165,000$ to 116 recipients. We express our thanks to our sponsors, Whitefish Mountain Resort, Averill Hospitality Group, Schure Sports (maker of the Karbon line of snowsports clothing), and Far West Racing Association.
We would also like to thank our partners, Skiyenti Ski Club, Mountain High Snowsports Club, Los Angeles Council of Ski Clubs, San Diego Council of Ski Clubs, Northwest Ski Club Council and Sierra League and Council. Finally, a special thanks to all the Far West members who have so generously contributed to the program.

United States Ski Association licensed junior racers in the U2I, U19, and second year U16 classes in states represented by FWSA affiliated councils
are eligible for a scholarship. This year junior racers in California, Nevada, Arizona, Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Utah and Wyoming are eligible.

Scholarships are awarded on the basis of financial need, competitive accomplishments, academics, and community service.

National ranking in competitive skiing can cost well in excess of $\$ 10,000$ per season; a financial challenge for even upper middle class families. The need is great and we anticipate that the number of applications will continue to increase.

Convention attendees have the opportunity to support the Athletic Scholarship Program by participating in the auction of a ski and stay package donated by Whitefish Mountain Resort and Averill Hospitalty Group, the silent auction featuring apparel by the U.S. Ski Team and finally, our raffle featuring an assortment of great prizes. Raffle tickets cost $\$ 5$ each or five for $\$ 20$.
All funds for the scholarship program are deposited with The Far West Ski

In many ways the maturity and stature of an organization can be measured by the value that individuals place on the recognition program. Far West has one of the broadest programs of any regional ski association in the country and there are many opportunities for aspiring individuals, clubs and councils to gain recognition.
The modern day Awards Program was initiated in 1966 and has witnessed a series of expansions and changes over the years. For 2007, optional electronic submissions and voting has been added to the Far West Service awards. The Charity and Community Service Recognition Award for Clubs and Councils were added in 2007. Historical recognition for clubs and councils was added in 2008. In 2008, under the direction of John Watson, the Snowsports Builder Award was initiated. The Environment Award was added in 2015.

This year all application forms were again standardized and fillable electronically. The Communications Awards continue to be done through online or email submittals and were modified again in 2018.

The Far West Service awards, sometimes referred to as "The Great Eight" are administered by Steve Coxen, FWSA Awards Chair and Immediate Past President, with a committee consisting of Todd Hood, FWSA Succession Planning Committee Chair, and Gloria Raminha, FWSA President. Use of the Internet continues to be the popular and a most efficient means of submitting nominations and voting. Voting was permitted using the Internet, email or by the traditional USPS mail. This and past year's nominee citations can be viewed at https:///fwsa.org/.

These awards are given to individuals or a team within the Far West Ski Association or Ski Industry. All accepted citations are archived at the Western SkiSport Museum in Boreal, California as a living history of volunteerism in the Far West Region. In addition to commemorative plaques and medallions, a permanent display of past recipients is showcased at the Museum. The Museum is administered by the Auburn Ski Club (http:// www.auburnskiclub.org/), one of the founding ski clubs of the Far West Ski Association.

Hans Georg Award (1966-present)
The Hans George Award is given for distinguished accomplishment and long-term contribution to snowsports. This award is given to an individual or individuals who have contributed significant achievements to snowsports, not necessarily organized snowsports. It reflects a long term contribution and is the highest award of the Far West Ski Association. This award may only be received once and is based on a ten-year minimum service in the Far West region.

Elizabeth 'Schatzi' Wood Award (1966-present)
The Elizabeth Schatzi Wood Award is given to the woman, in the Far West region, who has, through efforts in ski club, council, region, national or international activities, made a decisive contribution to snowsports during either the past year or in a prior year This award may only be received once and is based on one or two year achievement (not long-term service) in the Far West region. The two years of service can be for prior years, not just the past two years.
J. Stanley Mullin Award (1966-present) The J. Stanley Mullin Award is given to the man, in the Far West region, who has, through efforts in ski club, council, region, national or international activities, made a decisive contribution to snowsports during either the past year or in a prior year This award may only be received once and is based on one or two year achievement (not long-term service) in the Far West region. The two years of service can be for prior years, not just the past two years.

Jordan-Reily Award (I99| - present) The Jordan-Reily Award recognizes a one or two year activity and achievement in the FWSA Public Affairs programs-area development, skier safety, liability protections, governmental affairs, taxation and transportation. This award may only be received once and is based on one or two year achievement (not long-term service). This award may also be given to an individual in government or the ski industry.

Jimmie Heuga Award (1987-present) The Jimmie Heuga Award is given to the individual who, like Jimmie, has made a significant contribution to disabled snowsports and/or has overcome a physical disability and has been an inspiration to others. This award may only be received once.

Tommi Tyndall Award (1966-present) The Tommi Tyndall Award is given to the ski area, ski area operator; tourism bureau, or the ski area association who has made a distinguished contribution to snowsports and/or the Far West Ski Association in the past year or in prior years. This award may be received more than once but not in consecutive years. This award is based on one or two year contribution. The two years of service can be for prior years, not just the past two years.

Bill Mackey Award (1972 - present) The Bill Mackey Award is given for outstanding service to the snowsports public by a ski industry or ski area employee. This award may be received more than once but not in consecutive years. Recipients must be full-time employee in the ski industry or related industry and cannot be a FWSA board member; trustee or appointed chairperson.

Terry Smith Award (1976-present) The Terry Smith Award is given to an outstanding individual who has greatly contributed to the advancement of recreational ski racing. This award may only be received once. Only elected officers of Far West Racing Association, including race league chairpersons and past Terry Smith Award recipients, are allowed to nominate and vote.

## Snowsports Builder Award

John Watson, History Chair, along with the Far West Board of Trustees, administers the Snowsports Builder award. In 2008 Far West added this award to expand its suite of awards. The award recognizes an individual, teams or an organization that has made a contribution to benefit the sport, a contribution that has made an indelible impact on the sport and that may not have
been fully recognized. Such contributions may not be limited to any particular sector of industry, society, or the sport. Their background could include manufacturing, athletics, travel, journalism, electronic or print media, government, academia, teaching and safety. The Builders Award is intended to be for those outside Far West's traditional service awards and may be made annually by the Trustees.

## Industry Media Awards

The Industry Media awards are administered by Steve Coxen with a committee consisting of Randy Lew, FWSA Treasurer, and Gloria Raminha, FWSA President.

Billy Berry Award for Hard News (1966 - present) Awarded for outstanding service to snowsports by writers for the printed media of an outstanding article, book, blog, etc. This award allows for self-nomination and may be received more than once but not in consecutive years.

Billy Berry Award for Feature Article (1991present) Awarded for outstanding service to snowsports by writers for the printed media in a featured article. This award allows for self-nomination and may be received more than once but not in consecutive years.

## Warren Miller Modern Media Award (was the Bill Berry

 Modern Media Award from 1982 to 2004)Awarded for outstanding service to snowsports by the film, television, radio, and electronic media. This award allows for self -nomination and may be received more than once but not in consecutive years.

## Club \& Council Achievement Recognition Awards

A difference to the judging procedure was introduced in 2017. A committee from the Councils' President was formed to do all the judging. Criteria were changed slightly to make the process less complicated and add an emphasis on social media communications.

## Tollakson Award for Outstanding Club

The Tollakson Award is administered by Bill King, assisted by Chris Gill, FWSA VP of Council Services. Each club is asked to submit up a bio detailing their contributions to snowsports. Results from their Newsletter and Web site scores are included in this competition.

## Wentworth Award for Outstanding Club and Council Publications

The Wentworth Award is administered by Bill King, assisted by Chris Gill, FWSA VP of Council Services. Each club and council is asked to submit one newsletter for judging.

## Award for Outstanding Club and Council Web Sites

The Award for Outstanding Web Site is administered by Bill King, assisted by Chris Gill, FWSA VP of Council Services. Each club and council is asked to submit their web site URL for judging. Entries in the Publication Awards will have their web site automatically entered.

Classes for the Tollakson, Wentworth and Outstanding Web Site are based on a club's performance over the past four years that can vary slightly from year to year. A club may fall into a different class in each of the three categories.

Masters: Any club that has received a Ist place Ad vanced award or a Ist, 2nd or 3rd place Masters award for their club for outstanding club, publication or web site within the last four years.

Advanced: Any club that has received a Ist place Novice or a 2nd or 3rd place Advanced award for their club for outstanding club, publication or website within the last four years.
Novice: Club who has not won an award in the past 4 years or
Council: Open to all councils

## Recognition Awards

## Councils' Man \& Woman of the Year

The Councils' Man and Woman of the Year Competition is administered by Sheri Parshall, FWSA Secretary, assisted by Chris Gill, FWSA VP of Council Services. Each council is requested to submit a man and/or woman candidate who best represents their council. In addition, each council is required to submit one judge to help with the judging. This award is presented to both an outstanding man and woman at the grassroots level. Selection criteria is based on each individual's involvement in snowsports; club, council, regional and national activities; and knowledge and enthusiasm for the snowsports. Candidates should have awareness of Far West programs and, in particular, its public affairs involvement. Emphasis has been shifted to Club participation over the past five years. The Councils' Man and Woman of the Year is sponsored by Big White Ski Resort, BC, Canada since 2001.

## Richard Lubin Safety Person of the Year Award

This award is administered by Fran Long, FWSA VP of Public Affairs, assisted by Gloria Raminha, FWSA President. This award honors the person within FWSA who does the most to promote safe snowsports and safety programs at the club and/or council level. Individuals are judged through the utilization of organized events, educational forums, print and electronic media, on mountain activities and partnering with other, safety focused community and industry organizations. The Safety Award has been sponsored Mammoth Mountain since 2020.

## Western Ski Heritage Award

This award is administered by John Watson, FWSA History Committee Chair, assisted by Fran Long, FWSA VP of Public Affairs, and Gloria Raminha, FWSA President. This award recognizes an outstanding effort in the area of ski history by historians in the identification of resource material, preparation of historical publications and/or recording or documenting of significant historical events. This award also recognizes interest in Far West's history through collection, preservation and protection of appropriate articles and material. This award acknowledges the utilization of all types of media and is not limited to FWSA members. This award has been sponsored by Steamboat Ski \& Resort Corp. since its inception in 2000.

## Environment Award

This award is administered by Fran Long, FWSA VP of Public Affairs, assisted by Gloria Raminha, FWSA President. The award is designed to encourage good stewardship of our environment. We want to inspire and reward creative efforts to conserve and protect our environment. This award recognizes a special action that the applicant took, or something he or she put in place that made a difference. This award has been sponsored by Aspen Skiing Company, The Gant and Crestwood Condominiums since its inception in 2015 .

## Club and Council History Recognition Program

FWSA has inaugurated a program to collect club, league and council histories. This information will go to make up a historic
collection available to researchers and possibly a book of histories from the standpoint of organized snowsports. All submissions must be on CD/DVD with 5 copies and one hard copy. Notify John Watson, FWSA Historian at geospace@pacbell.net.

## Charity and Community Service Recognition Award

The Charity Award is administered by Sigrid Noack, Charity and Community Service Committee Chair, assisted by Chris Gill, FWSA VP of Council Services. There are 3 categories.

Double Diamond: A club that has won a Ist place in the past.
Diamond: A club that has not won a Ist place in the past
Council: A class of its own.

## President's Award

The President of FWSA selects the recipient. This award recognizes one or more individuals who have made a significant contribution during the year to the goals of the Far West Ski Association or to the snowsports experience of the "Western Skier."

## Snowsports Awards

## Joe Ross Memorial Trophy

This award is administered by the Far West Ski Association's Ski Week Staff and is presented to the club with the highest total points for the Slalom and Giant Slalom races at the FWSA North American Ski Week.

## Lake Louise Trophy

This award is administered by the Far West Ski Association’s Ski Week Staff and is presented to the council with the highest total points for the Slalom and Giant Slalom races at the FWSA North American Ski Week. The trophy, donated by the Canadian Tourism Office in 1997, is on permanent display at the Western SkiSport Museum (http:// auburnskiclub.com/ski-museum/) in Boreal, California.

## Council Challenge

The first Council Challenge was held in Mt. Bachelor when the Bay Area Council challenged the Northwest Council (then known as Portland Area Ski Club Council) to a duel race. Teams consisted of the best 6 racers from each council. In Steamboat the Challenge was opened up to all councils. In a surprise move, Arizona beat out Northwest, Bay Area and Los Angeles. Today teams consist of 8 racers from each council and must be a mix of men and women. And if you can't beat them on the course, your team can compete for the best costume.

## Far West Championships

Awarded to the Far West race league that earns the most points overall at the Far West Championships. The Far West Racing Association administers this award.

## Roma McCoy Trophy

Awarded to the Far West race league that earns the most points per racer start at the Far West Championships. The Far West Racing Association administers this award.

## Ski Industry Recognition Certificates

Long-term ski industry supporters and sponsors of Far West and the FWSA annual convention are recognized with certificates of appreciation. This award is administered by Debbi Kor, VP Marketing and Sponsorship.

# Director Report <br> Industry Marketing

Responsibilities for the Industry Marketing Program include: producing the Silent Auction and Travel Expo, sponsorship development, serving on the Convention Committee, and promoting advertising sales for the Far West Skier's Guide. Debbi Kor, FWSA Vice President of Marketing, is responsible for the membership benefits program and product sponsorship development. Jeannine Davis is past Chairman of the annual Silent Auction and the Travel Expo Coordinator. Leigh Gieringer is Editor of the Far West Skier's Guide. The ski industry invested over $\$ 105,000$ last year in Association industry programs.

## Silent Auction

In 2021,we are celebrating the 88th Annual Convention, and the 35th Silent Auction. FWSA highly values the longstanding working relationship that our Association has developed with the many ski and sports-industry partners over the years. Each year we look forward to seeing our industry friends at our Annual Convention, some of whom have attended for thirty years or more, and others who are brand new to our program.

The Silent Auction is the Association's major fund-raising effort and not only provides financial support for our programs, but also subsidizes delegate fees to the Convention. The Silent Auction and Travel Expo would not be possible without the assistance of many special people. Many thanks go to this year's Hosts, San Diego Council of Ski Clubs, as well as the many volunteers who helped with all the behind-the-scenes work and setup. Research shows that there is an overwhelming consensus among Special Olympics athletes, coaches and family members that there is significant improvement in athletes' sense of self, social skills, and social interactions due to their participation in Special Olympics. Disabled Sports USA (DS/USA), with the motto "If I Can Do This, I Can Do Anything," was founded in 1967, by disabled Vietnam veterans to provide opportunities for individuals with disabilities to gain self-confidence, greater independence, dignity, and mobility through sports, recreation and educational programs. The organization is the nation's largest multi-sport, multi-disability organization serving more than 60,000 people nationwide. Warfighter Sports, formerly known as the Wounded Warrior Disabled Sports Project, is a part of DS/USA and offers 50 different sports rehabilitation programs in military hospitals and communities across the US through a nationwide network of over 100 community -based chapters. Programs take place at sites throughout the US, offering returning Warfighters the opportunity to integrate as participants and mentors in their home communities. I,500 wounded veterans were served through this program just this past year. Many Warfighters have returned home to our FWSA communities, and several of our councils and clubs have been including them in their chapter activities. FWSA clubs and councils have a long term relationship with several California Chapters of Disabled Sports USA: Achieve Tahoe - the Adaptive Ski School at Alpine Meadows, USARC - the US Adaptive Recreation Center at Big Bear, The Achievers - DSUSA Orange County, The Unrecables - the Los Angeles Chapter, and DSES - Disabled Sports Eastern Sierra at Mammoth Lakes. ## Director Report Public Affairs

The Far West Ski Association Public Affairs Program purpose is to present to the outside world the interests, activities, positions that are important to the Association and to our contingency of snowsports enthusiasts.

## Consumer Advocacy/Trends

During the 2020-202I winter season, skier visits in the U.S. totaled 59 million, ranking as the fifth best season on record. According to the National Ski Areas Association. The 2019-2020 winter season, effected heavily by COVID-I9, saw 5 I.I million visits. Even taking into account the challenges regarding reduced capacity, lift line management, ticket sales, food and beverage services, etc., $78 \%$ of ski areas said their season exceeded their expectations.

During the shortened 2019-2020 winter season, ski areas were open just 99 days. During 2020-202I ski areas were open for II2 days. While an improvement, that number fell short of the average number of days ski areas operated during the 2018-20I9 season, which was 121 days.

## Area Development

Area development covers ski area expansion and enhancement, as well as proposed new areas. It also includes the debates that occur between the developers, the ski areas, and the environmentalists.

Squaw Valley/Alpine Meadows: The gondola project connecting the two resorts is moving forward.
Alterra Mountain Company plans to invest $\$ 207$ million in capital at Steamboat, Deer Valley, SquawValley/Alpine Meadows, and Mammoth Mountain.

Aspen Skiing Company is proposing to expand the Aspen Mountain Ski Area into the Pandora's terrain.
Purgatory Resort, just north of Durango, CO, is working with the U.S. Forest Service to expand its skiable terrain.
Sunlight Mountain, Glenwood Springs, CO, has plans to build a new chairlift and expand expert terrain on the ski area's East Ridge.

Loveland Ski Area received the go-ahead to expand its beginner terrain and to add additional parking.
Loveland Ski Area also got approval to offer guided snowcat tours in the Arapaho National Forest.
Steamboat Springs will be adding a new gondola, the longest 8 person gondola in North America.
Arapaho Basin has replaced two chairlifts, built a new Aerial Adventure Park, and installed radio-frequency identification ticket scanning gates.

Big Sky is preplacing their Swift Current quad chair with a new state of the art 6 person high speed chair, effectively increasing the uphill capacity out of the village by $50 \%$.

Utah has a proposed brand new ski area, Mayflower Mountain Resort. It is located beyond the eastern border of Deer Valley Resort.

## Safety

The overall purpose of the FWSA Safety program is to promote safety on and off the slopes to reduce snowsports injuries. January is National Safety Month. A program spearheaded by the National Ski Areas Association, the month of January is dedicated to an entire month of Safety. As you begin your snowsports adventure planning for the coming season, think about what you might be able to do for your ski club, your council, or your friends/family to promote a safer environment on the slopes.

Many resorts around the country participate in skier safety month, promoting safety and educating skiers and boarders about being safe and using common sense while on the slopes. You might consider checking in with your favorite resorts to see what sort of activities they might be offering to promote snowsports safety.

## Environment

The purpose of the FWSA Environment Program is to encourage snowsports participants to take an active role in conserving and protecting our environment in our homes, communities, and mountains.

Earth Day Facts by Richard Lubin, Former FWSA Safety Chair
In 1979, John McConnell, a peace activist, proposed a day of honoring the earth, to be celebrated on April 21 , 1970, on the first day of spring in the northern hemisphere. US Senator, Gaylord Nelson moved the date to a day later as an 'environmental teach-in', first held on April 22, 1970.

Senator Nelson served as both a US Senator and Governor of Wisconsin. He showed a lot of courage as a champion of environmental concerns. He was later awarded the Presidential Merit of Freedom, a high honor.

The date was moved to maximize participation. It was convenient in that it did not fall during exams or spring breaks to maximize college and school participation, nor did it interfere with Passover or Easter.

The first celebration took place in 2000 colleges and universities, 10,000 primary and secondary schools, and hundreds of communities across the United States. Columbia University in New York City, was the primary site. Fifth Avenue was closed with an estimated 10,000 people participating. It got 20 million Americans out into the spring sunshine for the environment. They liked the name Earth Day because it rhymed with birthday.

Earth Day is recognized in more than 193 countries. Earth Day, 2016 saw the Paris Agreement signed by the United States, China, and 193 other countries raising global government consciousness. It was sanctioned by the UN early on.

Earth Day is a great day to reflect on how great this planet is, and how to live consciously to protect it. It is a wonderful time to teach children and adults by doing something nice, like cleaning up a beach or any other stewardships of our favorite planet. Act locally, think globally!

Isn't every day EARTH DAY?
